**CLOTHIER MADE OVERLAND TRIP**

Reached Alice Arm From Stewart by Way of Moztladen Lake and White River.

ALICE ARM, July 19.—George Clothier, resident district mining engineer, and party consisting of Lade, Howard, Jackson and Marvin, reached Alice Arm on Monday from Stewart via the overland route. The party left Stewart on July 5 and report the trip without incident except the usual routine of mushing and camp-making. They specially mention the fine weather.

The journey was made with the object of further carrying out the reconnaissance work of the Department of Mines and the geographical and topographical features of the country were noted. Another object was to examine the country with a view to opening up and making accessible the mineral belt between Stewart and Alice Arm by means of a trail joining the Bear and Kitsault River valleys.

The present journey was made by way of Meriaden Lake and up the valley of the White River reaching the Alice Arm watershed near the Kitsault glacier at the head of the Kitsault River.
