The compressor will be purchased from the Canadian Ingersoll Rand Co. for \$851 and other equipment will be purchased from Mussions Limited, Frank Darling Co. and the Rupert Marine Iron Works.

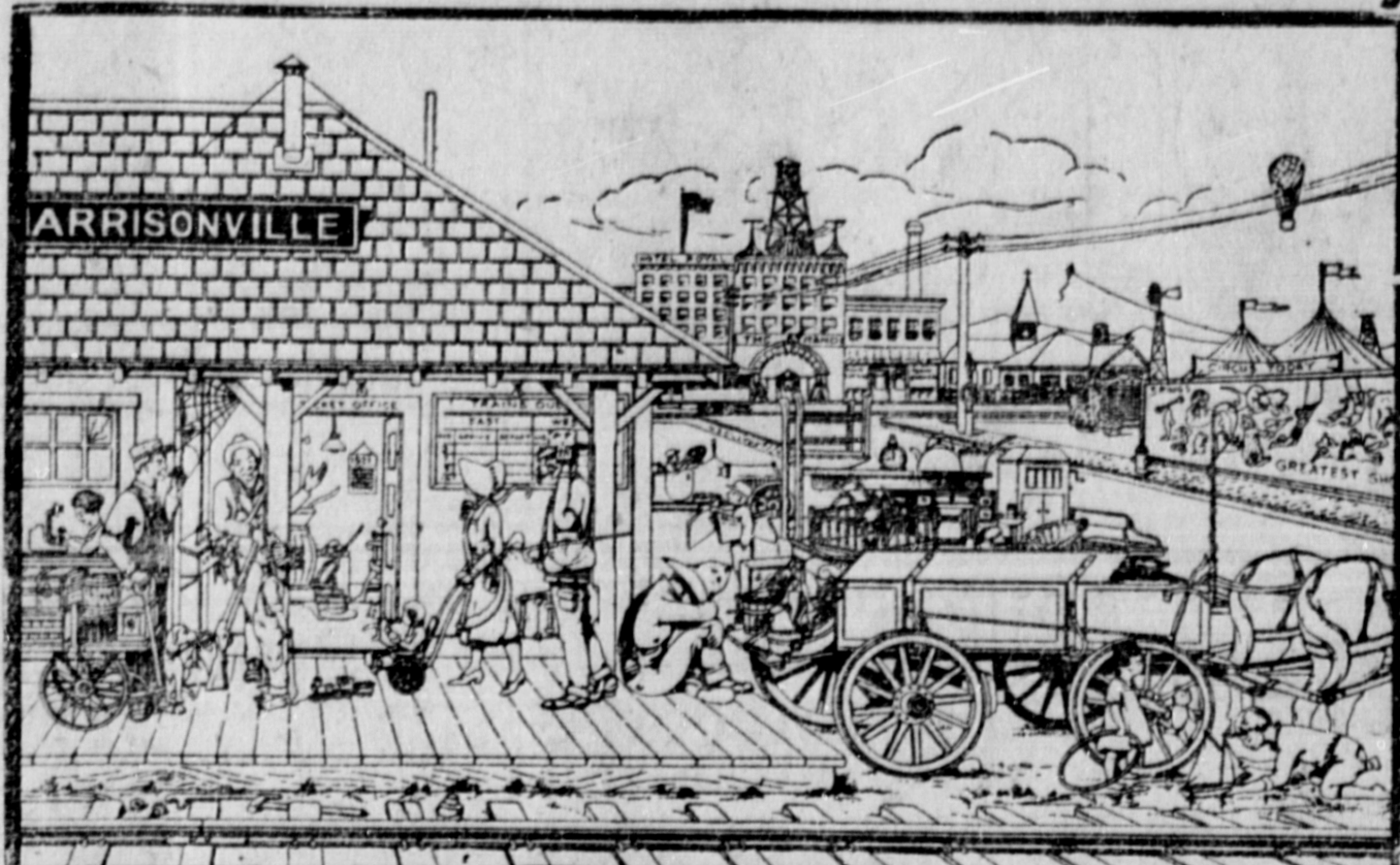

**CITY TO PURCHASE WHOLESALE BASIS FOR PUBLIC WORKS**

The city is to adopt the plan of purchasing supplies for its public works department on a wholesale basis. The city engineer was last night instructed by the council to call for tenders for materials necessary for a six months' period and have them stored in the basement of the fire hall. This will eliminate the necessity of a workman being sent for a requisition and then to a store whenever a single tool or piece of machinery is necessary and will, it is believed, effect quite a saving in cost.

Ald. Montgomery put forward the idea at last night's council meeting. It was supported by Ald. Montgomery, Ald. Collart, the city engineer and members of the council generally, who decided to carry it into effect at once.

**DOUBLING SIZE OF THE READING ROOM**

Report of Committee to This Effect Laid Over by Council Until After Library Vote.

The reading room on Fulton Street is to be doubled in size and an extension of the men's smoking room and the putting in of a ladies' rest room is to be provided for, according to a report made by the reading room committee to the city council last night. The report is to lie on the table until after the library bylaw vote has been taken and, in the meantime the city engineer is to get an estimate of the cost. According to the recommendation there will be a separate entrance on Fulton Street for the ladies' rest room, which will be in the southeast corner of the building.
