## PARLIAMENTS NOT BOUND FOR SPECIFIED TIME TO PACT

### Five-Year Clause In Canada-British Trade Covenant Ineffective

Old Country Government Intimates, However, That It Will Live Up to Spirit of Agreement as Long as It Is in Office

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The debate on the Ottawa trade agreements has revealed that Parliament is not bound for five years or any other period of time under the Canadian-United Kingdom agreement following rulings on certain points. Spokesmen for the administration, however, made it plain that the present government intended to live up to the spirit of the agreement in that respect.

### WINDS UP CAMPAIGN

Governor Roosevelt in New Jersey Today—in Brooklyn and New York at Week-End

ALBANY, N.Y., Nov. 3.—Details of the remainder of Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt's campaign for the presidency of the United States were announced yesterday. The Democratic nominee left today for an invasion of New Jersey. He will speak Friday night in Brooklyn and Saturday night in New York. Former Governor A. E. Smith, Democratic candidate for the presidency in 1928, will continue to take an active part in the campaign for Governor Roosevelt until election day next Tuesday.

### FLYING TO CALIFORNIA

Miss Ruth Nichols Out to Shatter New York-Los Angeles Record

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Miss Ruth Nichols, noted American aviatrix, had completed final preparations last night and was expecting to leave here early today on a non-stop flight to Los Angeles in the hope of breaking the existing record for the flight. Miss Nichols' flight is planned as a demonstration for the Republican party in the presidential campaign.

### FORTY-SIX MILLION AMERICANS QUALIFY TO VOTE THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 3.—A total of 46,965,230 persons are qualified to vote in the United States general election as compared with the record-breaking total of 42,337,254 who were eligible to vote in the 1928 campaign. The total of qualified persons for next week's election is over ten million in excess of the number who actually voted in 1928.

### SOCIALIST CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT UNABLE TO CAST VOTE HIMSELF

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Norman Thomas, Socialist candidate for president of the United States, will be unable to vote himself at the general election next Tuesday. He failed to register, being in the west on a campaign tour when the voters' list closed.

### WHITE MAN'S BODY FOUND

Discovery of Remains Made in Nation River District North of Fort St. James

VICTORIA, Nov. 3.—The body of a white man has been found in the isolated Nation River district, 110 miles north of Fort St. James, headquarters of the British Columbia police here have been advised. The discovery was reported by Indians to Coroner (Dr.) W. Ross Stone at Vanderhoof who stated that H. Derby, prospector, who left Fort St. James in January last, is the only person known to be unaccounted for in that area. The body was found in a tent.

### DEAL WITH MANCHURIA

League of Nations to Deliberate on November 21 on Lytton Commission Report

GENEVA, Nov. 3.—The League of Nations will commence its deliberations on the report of the Lytton Commission on Manchuria on November 21, it was announced yesterday. It had been originally intended to take the matter up on November 14.

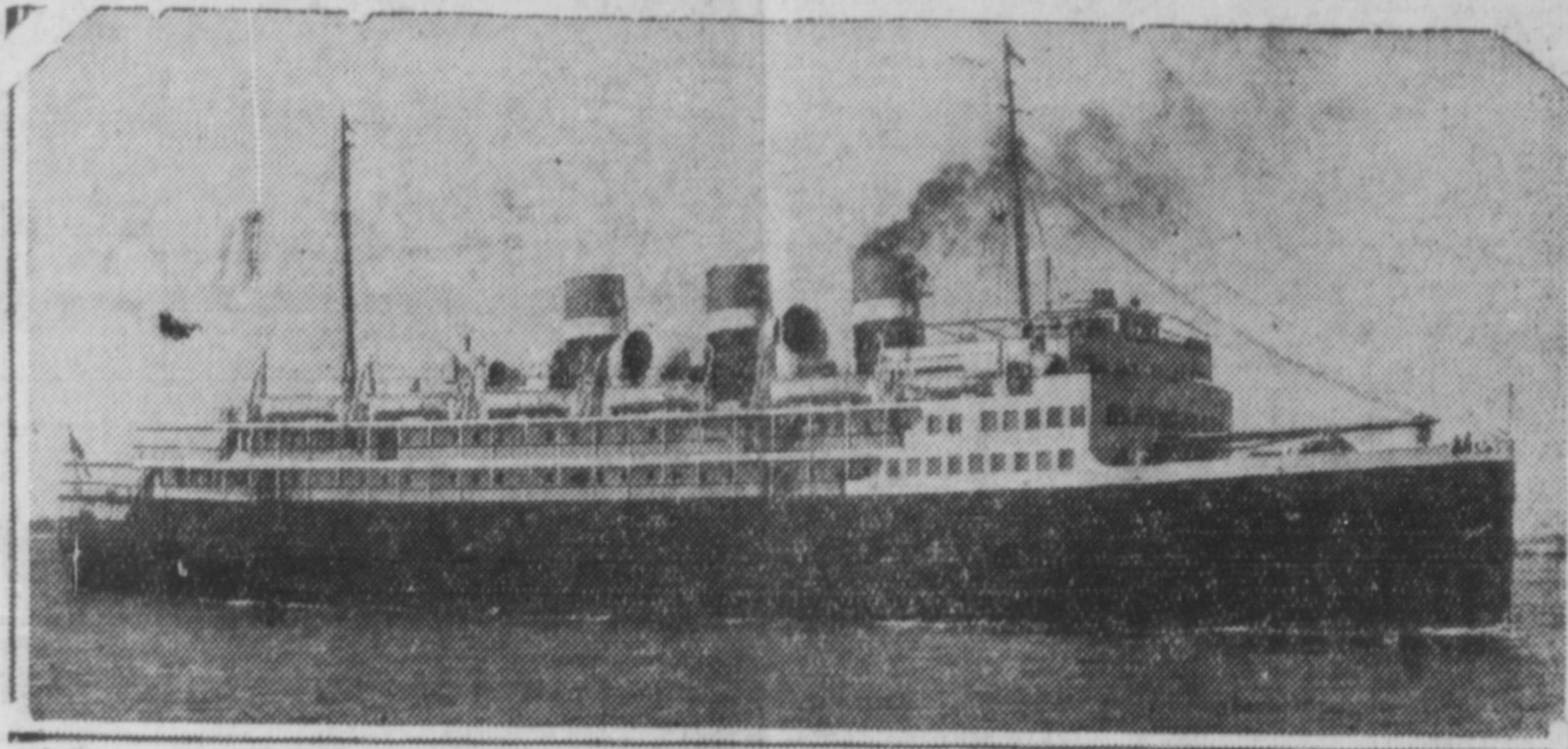

### Canadian National Ship Damages Bow, Hitting Halifax Concrete Dock

Stem of Vessel Crumpled in Impact When Capt. Griffin was Trying to Land His Ship Without Assistance of Tugs

HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 3.—The bow of the Canadian National liner Prince Henry was crumpled today when she crashed into the new Pier B in Halifax Harbor following her arrival from her regular weekly voyage to Bermuda. The crash occurred when a moderate northerly breeze swung the vessel fifteen feet off her course and against the concrete dock as she was attempting to tie up without the aid of tugs. Capt. H. O. Griffin, master of the vessel, and Pilot Frank Reyno were on the bridge at the time. The probability is that the steamer Prince David will take over the Bermuda service while the Prince Henry is undergoing repairs.

### REPORT ON RIOTS MADE

Forty-One Arrests Made and Forty-Four Injured in London, Home Secretary Tells House

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Sir John Gilmour, Home Secretary, informed the House of Commons yesterday that, during the riots of "hunger marchers" in the course of the past few days, forty-one arrests were made while twelve policemen and thirty-two unemployed had been injured. Sir John expressed regret that it had been necessary for the police to resort to the use of their clubs in quelling the disorders. He gave assurance, however, that the authorities would use any steps which were deemed necessary in dealing with such outbreaks. It was expected that today would have seen the last of the "hunger army" leaving the city for their homes in various parts of the British Isles.

### NEW LOAN ANNOUNCED

British Government to Offer Conversion Issue of £300,000,000 at Three Percent

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The fourth big governmental financial operation since spring was announced yesterday in the form of a new three percent conversion loan totalling £300,000,000 which will be offered at 97 1/2.

The loan will be used to pay off the remainder of unconverted war loans and five percent treasury bonds which were not taken up in a giant conversion loan last spring.

This transaction places the entire British long term credit practically on a three percent basis. So great was the rush of money for investment in the new loan that the lists were closed at 12:15 noon today instead of remaining open all day as had been originally planned.

### COMING TO PALO ALTO

President Hoover to Be Home For Election Day. It is Expected—Speaking in Middle West

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 3.—President Herbert Hoover, accompanied by Mrs. Hoover, left the capital this afternoon for his final campaign tour into the west prior to the presidential election on Tuesday of next week.

The president will speak tonight in Springfield, Ohio, Friday night in St. Louis and Saturday night in St. Paul. While Mr. Hoover's schedule is subject to change, it is expected the president will proceed from St. Paul to his home at Palo Alto, Cal., where it will be possible for him to arrive at noon on election day in time to vote himself.

### FORESEE VICTORY

Democrats Expect to Win in All Divisions in American Election Next Week

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Democratic campaign headquarters here claimed yesterday that not only would the Roosevelt-Garner ticket win easily in the presidential election next Tuesday but that the party would have a good majority in the Senate and a largely increased majority in the House of Representatives.

### EXCHANGE ALARMING

Government Concerned Over Sterling Situation, Declares Stevens

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, said in the House of Commons yesterday that the government was deeply concerned about the British exchange situation. He was hopeful for an early solution of the difficulties, possibly from the coming world economic conference. If he had been sure there was no other solution, he would have supported the Coote proposal to make ratification of the Anglo-Canadian trade treaty contingent upon establishment of parity between the Canadian dollar and the British pound, Mr. Stevens said.

### NEW YORK MART WEAK

Issues Dropped in Last Half Hour of Gotham Trading Yesterday

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Issues dropped again under an avalanche of selling during the last half hour of trading on the New York Stock Exchange yesterday after advancing slowly early in the day. Ralls and industrials recorded declines of about a point and a half. Decreases in utility prices were not quite so sharp.

The closing industrial average was 58.53, off 1.69. Ralls closed at 25.73, off 1.55 and utilities closed at 25.83, off .80. The day's turnover was 1,096,000 shares.

### PROBE OF SUN LIFE

Speaker Refuses to Entertain Motion—Supported By House Division

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—M. F. Hepburn, Liberal member for West Elgin, made a proposal in the House of Commons yesterday for an investigation into the management of the Sun Life Assurance Co. but was ruled out of order by Mr. Speaker George Black.

The Speaker's ruling was challenged by J. S. Woodsworth, Labor member for Winnipeg, and the House upheld the Speaker on the first division of the session by a vote of 128 to 55. The Conservatives voted en bloc in support of the Speaker's ruling and were supported by fifteen Liberals.

### UNITED FARMER MOTION IS BEATEN AT OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—The House of Commons last night defeated a motion by C. G. Foote, United Farmer of Alberta member, which would have made ratification of the Anglo-Canadian trade treaty contingent upon the establishment of parity between the Canadian dollar and the British pound. The motion was defeated by a majority of 38.

### Former California School Official Is Guilty of Forgery

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3.—A plea of guilty to charges of forgery was entered by Elliott B. Thomas, former superintendent of schools at Redondo Beach. The former official has confessed to obtaining \$8000 by forging the names of school trustees to payroll accounts over a period of two years. Sentence was reserved by the court.

### DIVIDEND DECLARED

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—General Motors Corporation yesterday declared its regular quarterly dividend of 25 cents on common stock.

### PLEADED TOO SOON

Mississippi Negro Admits Manslaughter Although Jury Finds Him Not Guilty

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 3.—Apparently becoming impatient after a jury which was trying him on a charge of murdering a woman had been out for an hour, David Lawrence, colored, informed the judge in a Mississippi court yesterday that he would like to plead guilty to manslaughter. The judge accepted the plea and sentenced Lawrence to seven and a half years in penitentiary.

A short time later the jury filed back into the courtroom and, when asked for its verdict, announced that it had found Lawrence "not guilty."

The judge's sentence will stand.

### MATRICIDE IS SOUGHT

Police of Pacific Coast Renew Their Search For Richard Carter of Seattle

SEATTLE, Nov. 3.—Police of the Pacific Coast are renewing an intensive search for Richard Carter, who escaped from custody here one month ago when awaiting trial on a charge of murdering his foster-mother, Mrs. Sadie Carter. Carter, it has been learned, completed serving a 30-day sentence at Pomona, Cal., for vagrancy a few days ago. He was released from the Pomona jail before his finger prints were checked.

### Next Friday is Public Holiday

Announcement in Regard to Remembrance Day is Made By Attorney General

VICTORIA, Nov. 3.—Remembrance Day, Friday, November 11, will be observed as a public holiday in the province of British Columbia, it was announced yesterday by Hon. R. H. Pooley, Attorney General.
