GIFTS THAT LAST

To Holders of Five Year 5 1/2 per cent Canada's Victory Bonds

Issued in 1917 and Maturing 1st December, 1922.

CONVERSION PROPOSALS

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE offers to holders of these bonds who desire to continue their investment in Dominion of Canada securities the privilege of exchanging the maturing bonds for new bonds bearing 5 1/2 per cent interest, payable half yearly, of either of the following classes:—

(a) Five year bonds, dated 1st November, 1922, to mature 1st November, 1927.

(b) Ten year bonds, dated 1st November, 1922, to mature 1st November, 1932.

While the maturing bonds will carry interest to 1st December, 1922, the new bonds will commence to earn interest from 1st November, 1922, GIVING A BONUS OF A FULL MONTH'S INTEREST TO THOSE AVAILING THEMSELVES OF THE CONVERSION PRIVILEGE.

This offer is made to holders of the maturing bonds and is not open to other investors. The bonds to be issued under this proposal will be substantially of the same character as those which are maturing, except that the exemption from taxation does not apply to the new issue.

Holders of the maturing bonds who wish to avail themselves of this conversion privilege should take their bonds AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE, BUT NOT LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 30th, to a Branch of any Chartered Bank in Canada and receive in exchange an official receipt for the bonds surrendered, containing an undertaking to deliver the corresponding bonds of the new issue.

Holders of maturing fully registered bonds, interest payable by cheque from Ottawa, will receive their December 1 interest cheque as usual. Holders of coupon bonds will detach and retain the last unmatured coupon before surrendering the bond itself for conversion purposes.

The surrendered bonds will be forwarded by banks to the Minister of Finance at Ottawa, where they will be exchanged for bonds of the new issue, in fully registered, or coupon registered or coupon bearer form carrying interest payable 1st May and 1st November of each year of the duration of the loan, the first interest payment accruing and payable 1st May, 1923. Bonds of the new issue will be sent to the banks for delivery immediately after the receipt of the surrendered bonds.

The bonds of the maturing issue which are not converted under this proposal will be paid off in cash on the 1st December, 1922.

HAD TWO QUARTS IN HIS VIOLIN CASE POLICE INTERFERED

WINNIPEG, Sept. 16—Heartless policemen frustrated plans for an evening of music laid by Steve Savochynoke, of 446 1/2 King Street, Thursday. The contents of his violin case were seized as well as his person, and in the provincial police court Magistrate A. Dubuc fined him \$200, in default three months, when he pleaded guilty to a charge of having liquor in other than his private dwelling.

Early Thursday evening Steve, carrying his violin case, entered 103 Edward Street with the intention police claim, of providing music all night if the "violin" had lasted that long under the severe treatment it would have received. The party was over before it had well started, though, and Steve was not given a chance to show his skill with the stringless violin which his case contained. Constable Foss was waiting in the house to receive the visitors—Steve had a companion—but they did not appreciate his politeness. In fact, they tried to leave immediately without opening the violin case, and were only persuaded to stay when Constables Douglas and De Cruyener joined the party.

The police had thought that Steve did not look so musical as his violin case would suggest by itself, and their suspicions were confirmed when they found the instrument it concealed was two quart bottles, containing a clear liquid. It looked like water, but is understood to have more bite. Police have suspicions that it would test not more than 90 per cent, but could not estimate the strength with any certainty without tasting it.
