GOODWILL VISITS

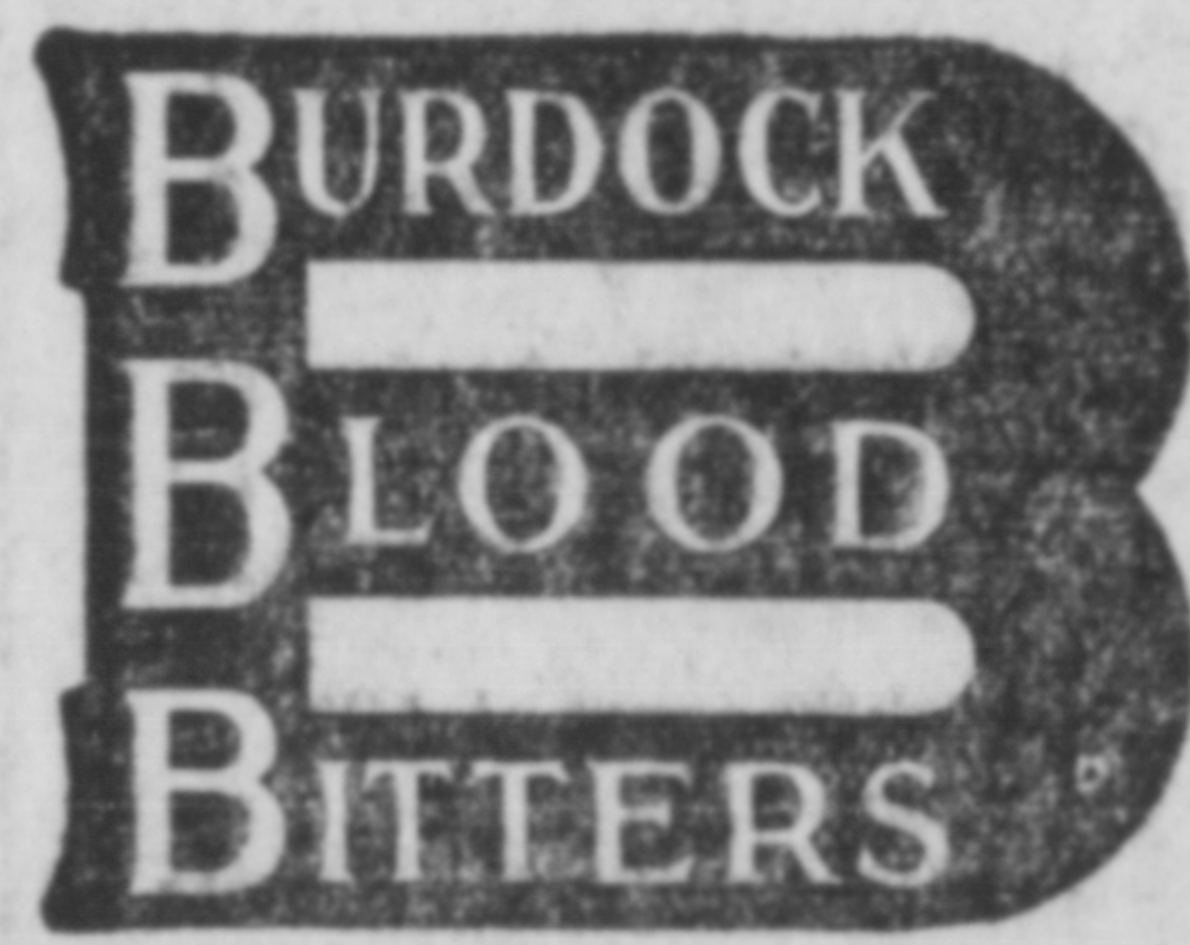

It is also rumored that British interests in Argentina have been active in securing the elimination of Canadian competition.

MANCHURIA VERY LARGE

New Nation Which Japan Has "Recognized" Has Already Half as Big a Population

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Nov. 3.—If Manchoukuo—new name for old Manchuria—is admitted to the family of nations, it will be a sizeable addition.

Japan has declared she will in the near future extend official recognition to the administration of which Henry Pu-Yi nominally is ruler, an administration set up by and with the protection of Japan following the military activities in Manchuria during last winter.

The United Kingdom and the United States, with other powers signatory to the peace treaties, have declared they cannot recognize treaties or agreements concluded following such military activities, in any part of the world.

More definite light was shed on Manchoukuo's relations with the world powers following the appearance of the special report by the commission established by the

League of Nations, headed by Lord Lytton, which not only investigated the circumstances surrounding the changes in Manchuria but incidentally delved into the Shanghai episode which cost so many lives. The report comes up this month for action by the League of Nations assembly. As was freely predicted it has proven unsatisfactory to Japan and in this connection the tone of Foreign Minister Yasyua Uchida's recent outline of foreign policy to the diet was anticipatory.

But if Japan carries out her plan for permanent establishment of the free state on Manchoukuo, as it is termed, Pu-Yi will rule over a country more than twice as big as the Japanese Empire, and containing a population half as great.

Manchoukuo is roughly three times the size of Germany—if you include the buffer state of Jehol which the Chinese claim Japan intends to annex to Manchuria—and two and a half times the size of France. Manchuria proper has an area of 363,000 square miles, Japan an area of 177,000 square miles. The population of Manchoukuo is computed at 30,000,000.

Korea, which Japan annexed in 1930 after breaking China's hold on it, is only about one-sixth the size

of Manchoukuo with less than half the population.

Count Uchida asserted Japan had no thought of annexing Manchoukuo but would recognize the new government and complete a mutual defence pact.

Of Manchuria—or Manchoukuo—population more than 28,000,000 are Chinese. There are about 360,000 Koreans, less than 300,000 Japanese, more than 100,000 Russians and a scattering of other foreigners. Japan is estimated to have 10,000 troops in the state.
