Absorbed in a debate over whether or not the revised United States football code this season is really an improvement over the 1931 set, American gridiron fans were hardly prepared for the slashing criticism of the game which has broken out again even more violent than last year. The southern states have been rocked by a slashing criticism in the University of Tennessee publication. Declaring "amateurism is a farce" the editorial suggested "a certain percentage of the gate receipts should be divided among the players in proportion to their value to the team." Commenting on a ruling of the Southern Conference which declared ineligible one, Nollie Felts, of Tulane, Ga., because he had played a couple of professional baseball games, the editorial states:

"Certainly those who guide the destinies of this group of college teams must possess an unusual sense of honor to declare ineligible on the one hand a man who has violated a mere technicality of the amateur code and, on the other hand, to ignore either willingly or negligently flagrant evils which have arisen as the result of our so-called amateurism. Whether or not Felts is technically guilty, he deserves an apology from these officials for being censured for professionalism particularly when one considers all sorts of subterfuge are resorted to remain within the letter of the law which demands pure amateurism of college athletes. Football, even in college, is a professional sport. The players get their pay—and rightly so. They earn it."

## BRUINS TO BE WATCHED

National Hockey League Tail-Enders Likely Contenders For Honors This Winter

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Watch those Bruins. This is the word travelling in hockey circles these days as ardent followers of the winter pastime look to the approach of the most evenly matched race in the National Hockey League in recent years, starting on Thursday of next week.

Tail-enders of the American group of the N. H. L. last winter, the Boston club, under the tutelage of the crafty Art Ross, has recruited additional scoring punch in the off season and is out to regain the Stanley Cup which rested in the Beantown in 1929. While other clubs had been mostly talking trades, Ross has put through four important deals and at present his squad shapes up as one of the most feared organizations in the league.

Purchase of Nelson Stewart, husky centre of Montreal Maroons, gave the Bruins a giant scoring threat. This, however, is not the only strengthening the Boston mentor has done for he has added such high class performers as Joe Lamb, speedy forward with New York Americans last year, Billy Burch, veteran centre of the same club, and Orville "Obs" Heximer, a Niagara Falls youth who has starred for three seasons with Springfield in the Canadian American League.

Such stars as Goalie "Tiny" Thompson, Eddie Shore, Red Beattie and Dit Clapper alongside the new additions make the Bruins appear headed for high ranking in the 1932-33 race.

### Others Follow Lead

Following Boston's lead in building up a strong machine for the long winter grind, Montreal Maroons, New York Rangers and the reincarnated Ottawa Senators have all taken a step forward.

Rangers figured in a big deal when they secured Babe Seibert, sterling winger of Maroons. The Kitchener product, a capable front-line performer as well as a rugged defense man, will likely team up with Cecil Dillon and Butch Keeling on the second line of the Patrick squad when he is not used on the defense.

Losing two stalwart forwards in Stewart and Seibert, Jimmy Strachan started out to rebuild his fighting Maroon machine. In a cash deal with Chicago Black Hawks the Montreal leaders landed a high class defenseman in Marvin "Cyclone" Wentworth. It is not yet certain whether Lionel Conacher will forsake the wrestling game to again take his place on the Maroon rear-guard but Strachan has high hopes of adding several young players to his roster before the grind gets under way.

Ottawa Senators, re-entering the league after a year's absence, were in the field for a little new material. First step in bolstering their line-up for the coming campaign was trading Joe Lamb to Boston for Cooney Welland and a pot of cash. The Capital City club, whose players were farmed out last season to other squads in the league will be back in Ottawa harness again.

Toronto Maple Leafs, Montreal Canadiens, Chicago Black Hawks and Detroit Falcons have done little off season building and will field much the same organizations which wound up the last campaign.
