In fact, all but one of the varsity stars who showed iconoclastic ability last year are in the field again, while several new candidates for record laurels have come to the fore lately, so it seems a foregone conclusion that practically the

BUSY YEAR IN SPORT WORLD

All Branches Will Reach Greater Popularity is New York Opinion.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—(By the Associated Press).—Sport, both amateur and professional, will reach a plane of popularity during 1922 never touched in the past, according to the expressed opinions of athletic leaders on the event of the new year. Regardless of the outpouring of millions of spectators and contestants in the games of the past 12 months it is the unanimous belief of those best qualified to gauge the development of sport, that the coming season will witness new records in interest, participation and attendance. That these opinions are based upon substantial grounds is shown by the rapidly increasing list of important contests, both inter-sectional, national and international, which are being added to the 1922 sport schedules. International tennis, golf, yachting and track meets are already in the making; numerous inter-sectional football games have been ordered and there will be a wider increase in entries for various national championships, both numerically and geographically, than in the past.

From all sections of America comes the report that interest in sport is steadily growing; the formation of new inter-sectional and intercollegiate associations; wider participation in games; the development, physically, of the youth of the land and the belief that sport in the broadest application of the word will be a growing factor in the history of America for decades to come.

The first step in arrangements for the Davis Cup matches of 1922 has been taken by the United States Lawn Tennis Association which has sent letters to nations that have competed for this trophy inviting their challenges for next year's contest. These must be received before March 22. As the holder of the cup it devolves upon the United States to issue these invitations. It is understood that America is desirous of as much competition interest in tennis, it is likely there will be many entries.

At the height of his playing career John J. McGraw, then a member of the Baltimore Club, was sold with two other star baseball players to the St. Louis team for \$15,000. Last month the same John J. McGraw, as vice president of the New York National League baseball club, paid the sum of \$175,000 for two players, one of whom will not be available for the Giants until the 1923 season. In the spread of these two deals is epitomized the progress of baseball in two decades. The players involved in the latest deal are Heinie Groh, of Cincinnati, \$100,000, and Jimmy O'Connell, of San Francisco Pacific Coast team, \$75,000.

It is a melancholy fact that boxing in Great Britain is becoming a rapidly dying art, says the Manchester Guardian. Many important contests have been staged in England since the war between men of apparently the highest reputation in their profession. Hundreds of thousands of people in keen anticipation, have flocked to see one of these exhibitions of the noble art, and more often than not have returned home sadly disappointed. Rarely does one see variety in attack or defence. Each round seems to be cut from the pattern of the first. Ingenuity, craft, intelligence, seem to be rigorously barred by our modern boxers. Skill has gone by the board. Routs today have no sparkle, and hardly ever convey a sense of awesome tension; they are generally dull, boring affairs.
