DISCUSS CLOTHING

National Unemployed Workers in Session Last Night—Ask Permission to Take Game

The regular weekly meeting of the National Unemployed Workers' Association was held last evening in the new quarters of the Canadian Labor Defence League in the Exchange Block, over three hundred attending.

The question of clothing for children under school age and over school age was discussed at length. It was finally resolved that a strong delegation approach the city council in this matter and that the council be given one more opportunity to accept or repudiate responsibility for the supplying of needed clothing for these children.

Discussion arose on the restrictions of the Game Act that prevented the unemployed from supplementing their food supply without violating the law. It was resolved that the provincial government be asked to grant permission to the unemployed of Northern British Columbia to hunt game for their needs.

Announcement was made of a mass meeting of all workers in Prince Rupert, employed or unemployed, to be held in the Moose Hall on Sunday.

The Survival of the Sweetest

CORN FLAKE CHARLOTTE

Two and a half cups corn flakes, two cups sweetened apple sauce, rind of one-half lemon or juice of one-half orange or lemon, two tablespoons butter.

Butter a pudding dish and pour in a layer of corn flake crumbs. Cover with apple sauce to which the fruit juice or lemon rind has been added. Sprinkle the top with a layer of corn flakes. Dot with butter. Bake 15 to 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve with whipped cream.

Put the corn flake charlotte right in the oven with the ham and potatoes after the latter dish has been baking about 40 minutes. If the dessert is not brown when the ham and potatoes are done, leave it in the oven for a few minutes longer and increase the heat slightly. While the main part of this dinner is cooking in the oven, heat the beets, drain and season with butter, salt and pepper. Whip the cream for the dessert and make the beverage. Finish setting the table, and the dinner is ready to serve.

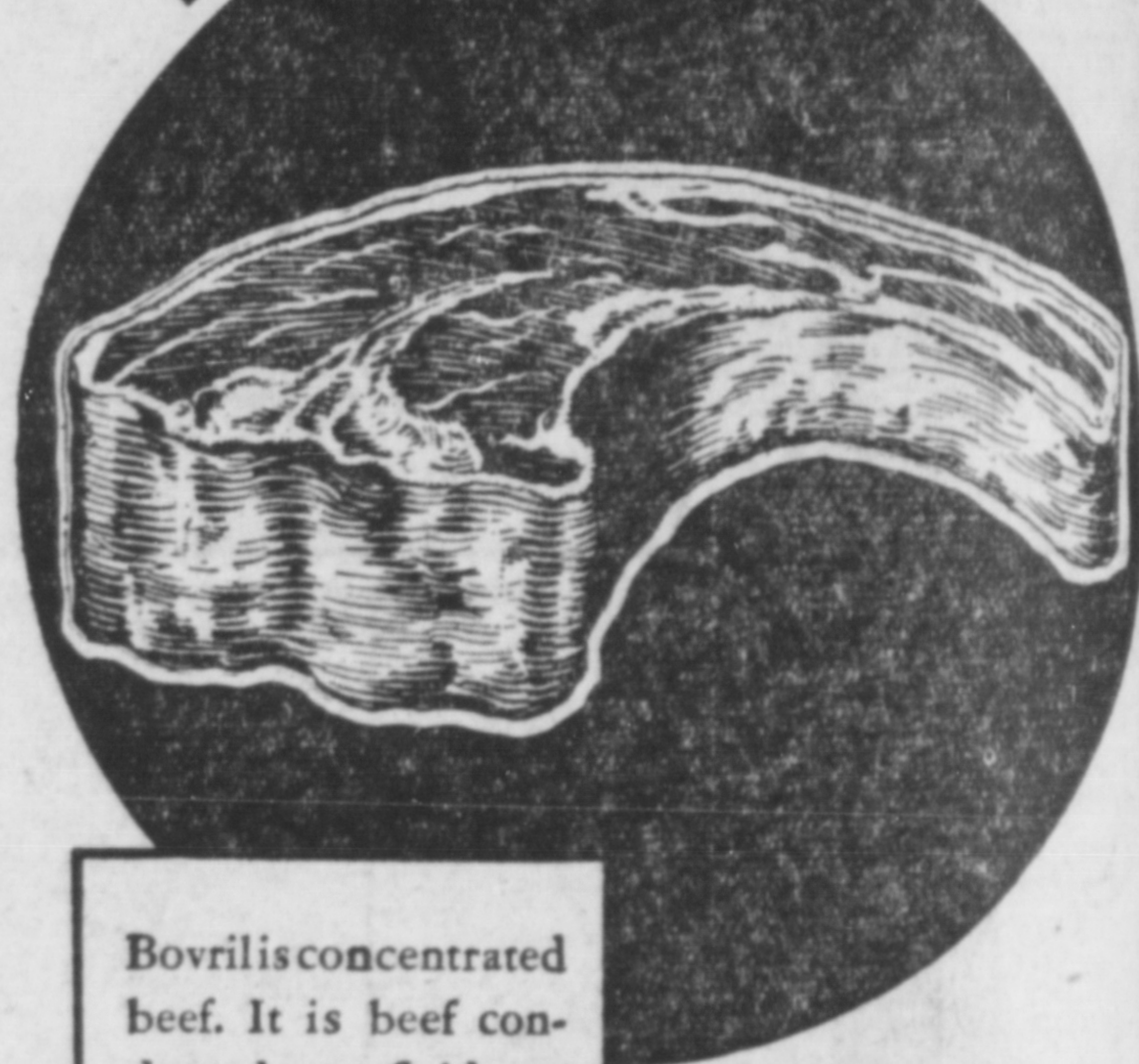
