LAW ASKED FOR BY TRADES AND LABOR CONGRESS EXECUTIVE

S. D. Macdonald Reported to the Council last Night on Recent Meeting With B.C. Cabinet

Some of the recommendations made to the provincial cabinet by the B.C. Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada at their recent meeting in the south, as reported by S. D. Macdonald, member of that executive, to the local Trades and Labor Council last night, were as follows:

Abolition of poll taxes.
Equality between children in the matter of receiving education so that the child of the poor parents may have as good a chance of rising through merit as the child enjoying financial advantages.
A system of scholarship open to all.
Unemployment insurance.
Extension of the functions of the Workmen's Compensation Act to embrace workers' families.
Printing of school text books in British Columbia rather than Eastern Canada.
Amendments to the Workmen's Compensation Act so that disabilities such as strain, rupture and hernia could be satisfactorily dealt with, also the right of appeal from the medical referee of the Board to a body appointed by the medical society.
Re-affirmation of the 8-hour day.
Modification of license fees for cars driven for industrial purposes or else a license fee covering cars of all descriptions; raising of the age limit of

FIVE HUGE RADIO PLANTS IN CHINA ARE TO BE SET UP

Powerful Wireless Stations Will Communicate Direct With America

TOKYO, Dec. 13. — Five huge radio plants are to be established in China to provide direct communication with America. R. P. Scherwin, president of the Federal Telegraph Company, has arrived here with a party of American engineers to build the first of the stations. There are to be two stations at Shanghai and one each at Harbin, Canton and Peking. Mr. Scherwin says that Shanghai will soon have the largest and most powerful wireless stations in the world. Japanese authorities have protested against the scheme on the ground that the project will violate an agreement between the Chinese government and Mitsui Bussan Company of Japan.
