

#### Favor Fishermen and Farmers.

Fishermen from the United States may register their vessels on this side the boundary without paying duty just as an American farmer may bring in his stock and implements without paying duty, asslong as he is going to settle in this country. If he sells them within a year after arrival, the duty is charged against the goods.

Another favor secured from the Liberal government at Ottawa is the abolition of the sales tax, now amounting to six per cent., on almost all fishing gear and other material used by the fishermen. This also is an important concession to the business which has never before this been recognized.

The change has been brought about through the representations of the local member, Fred Stork, and through the efforts of the delegation which went from here. If they have done nothing else they have earned the money and effort that was spent in sending them and the city will reap the benefit. It means that the local business houses will be able to do business on equal terms with American houses.

Lumber Being

If four car loads can be shipped, so can twenty. It may be a harbinger of better things to come. It may be the beginning of a business which will again make things active in this port. 
Shipping Business From This Port.
