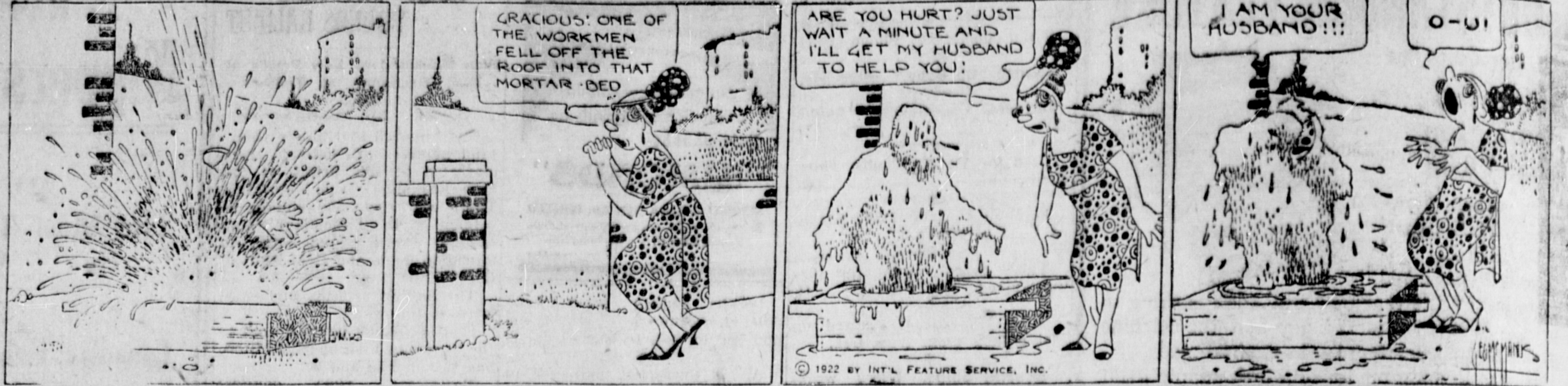

It was stated that the team was one of the best in Alberta and was also going to play in Vancouver. The local association, at its meeting last night, decided to make no guarantee but to arrange the games on a percentage basis. The prospective visitors will be advised to this effect.

New York Yankees and New York Giants seem to be holding well on to the leadership of the American and National Leagues respectively and, from this early view of the situation, it would appear that the World Series party this fall will again be an exclusively Gotham affair. The Yanks have a lead of four games in the Junior League and the St. Louis team is the runner-up while Cleveland and Detroit are

striving to keep above the half-way mark. Philadelphia Americans, who have decorated the stellar position for so many years now, are topping the second division with Chicago in the cellar. The Giants have a decisive lead in the National race of seven games over St. Louis which is getting a close run for second honors from Pittsburgh, Brooklyn and Cincinnati are hanging around the 500 mark and Philadelphia is pretty well established in the basement. The clubs are remaining more closely together in the American League than in the National.

The prairie chickens continue to show their heels to the coast fish eaters in the Western International League and the past few days has seen Calgary and Edmonton clubs further lengthen the distance between them and Vancouver and Tacoma. In fact, rivalry is pretty keen between the two Alberta teams for first place and it is only a matter of one game which divides Calgary, the league leader, from Edmonton, the runners up. Trailing along in third place and just below the fifty percent average, is Vancouver while Tacoma is somewhat far in the cellar. Vancouver is playing this week in Calgary and Tacoma and Edmonton are performing before the fans of the Capital city. The teams will be back on the coast next week.

"BACK PAY" TONIGHT
AT THE WESTHOLME

Odd Story With Strong Dramatic Flavor Starring Seena Owens

A bedroom setting that is a delight to the eye was created for "Back Pay," a Fannie Hurst story. The room is decorated with lavender silk, the panels of the walls matching this color scheme. There is a magnificent bed adorned with a lace counterpane. A gold dresser set is seen on a dressing table. Everything is in the height of luxury.

This display of wealth is of intense dramatic significance because it is in this room, in the apartment of Hester Bevins, that Hester's sweetheart in the country town in which she formerly lived, is brought to die after he has been blinded at the front in France.

Hester Bevins goes to New York from the country, disgusted with the ways of a small town. Jerry assures her before she goes that he will love her forever. But Hester longs for luxuries which Jerry cannot afford and in New York she gets them.

Jerry, at the outbreak of the war, enlists and at the front is blinded and gassed. Brought back dying to the United States, Jerry calls for Hester.

The girl decides that Jerry's last days shall be spent in comfort, so she marries him and takes him to her apartment. We see him in the beautiful boudoir, but being blind, Jerry has no knowledge of the luxury that surrounds him. Hester, to keep Jerry in ignorance of her recent life, assures him that it is a simple room in a small flat. It is the contrast between the gorgeous setting and the kindly deception practiced by Hester, that lends to this scene its dramatic value.
