## WILL RECOMMEND THAT BUILDING OPERATIONS BE CARRIED THROUGH

M. Parfitt Would Build Permanent One-Storey Building on McLaughlin Site.

M. Parfitt, The Victoria contractor, who came here to inspect the McLaughlin building site with a view to proceeding with operations already commenced there by the late W. B. McLaughlin, returned south on the Prince George last night. Mr. Parfitt made a careful examination of the site and local conditions and is now going to recommend to Mrs. Gray of California, sister of the deceased, that the structure be built but that the plans be changed to provide for a one storey concrete building with pressed brick front divided into three store premises with plate glass windows.

The idea of having a second floor with apartments Mr. Parfitt would not recommend at this time, although he will probably suggest to Mrs. Gray that the building be such that the second floor may be added at a later date. The approximate cost of the building that Mr. Parfitt proposes will be \$9000.
