FRENCH TALKS OF FAR NORTH

Head of Fur Department of Hudson's Bay Co. Gives Interesting Lecture.

"When I hear anyone speaking about mushing across the snow, or mentioning the word 'mush' when talking about dog teams, I feel like throwing something at him," said Charles H. French, head of the fur department of the Hudson's Bay Company, when addressing delegates to the Associated Boards of Trade convention in the Empress Hotel at Victoria on the life and customs of natives of the Arctic regions.

Years ago, according to Mr. French, the natives and French traders in handling their dog teams shouted in the word "marche," when they wanted the dogs to drive forward. The word was derived from the French "marchons." Those that came after the original traders wore the word down to "mush," which according to Mr. French, has neither sense nor effect.

Method of Dying.

When the old men of the northern tribes feel they are becoming a burden on their community they announce that it is time for their passing. The tribe then goes through a ceremony of wailing and persuades the old man to change his mind. According to Mr. French, he always does, saying that he will wait one year. He carries out this promise to the letter, and when a year has passed he goes into a hut, places a spear to his heart, leaving the shaft sticking out through the roof. It is the duty of the eldest son to drive the spear home with a blow from a club, and the old-timer is then buried. That goes for the old men, but the old women must be hanged, and they have to carry out the job themselves.

Mastodon Meat.

Mr. French said that the natives of Siberia were still eating the meat of mastodons which were alive ages ago. Amundsen, the famous Norwegian explorer, told him of having seen many of these huge creatures buried in a natural cold storage in caves. The mastodons had apparently sought shelter and had been enveloped by a sudden deluge of water and drowned, or else buried under a landslide. Mastodon steak was considered a great delicacy. Inside the mastodons he said could be found prehistoric grass and other feed perfectly preserved.

Another article of food, said Mr. French, is half-digested claws removed from slaughtered walruses, which use their great tusks for digging in the sand. For "comforters" Eskimo children use pieces of whale blubber fastened to bits of string, he said.

TAKING BIRDS FROM ENGLAND TO CHARLOTTE

Dr. E. H. Lawson Has Interesting Consignment of 27 Feathery Creatures in City.

The sub-tropical birds, enroute from England to Massett, has been keeping up the spirits of the staff of the local Canadian Express office which looks something like a rare bird aviary these days.

These 27 little feathered creatures which are now here belong to Dr. E. H. Lawson, of London, England, who has been in the city for the past few days enroute to Massett Inlet, Graham Island, where he is going to settle and make arrangements for further English settlers. They have been visited this week by many interested persons including a lot of school children.

There are several different species of birds including Australian love birds, peculiar for their habit of billing and cooing and kissing each other. Mule birds, zebra birds, Java birds, from the Island of that name, and canaries and other varieties. The love birds are of a bright green hue and are not unlike parakeets. The Java birds are brownish in color and are very timid little creatures. Two birds who are mounting and are of a quarrelsome disposition were moved from the mule bird cage to the canary cage where they have since been quite agreeable.

In all there are four cages. Dr. Lawson says he is taking the birds to the Islands and will keep them in an aviary which he has already established there. If they thrive he intends to liberate them. They are birds which breed and thrive in England and he sees no reason why they should not do well on the Islands. They are mostly sub-tropical birds of a more hardy variety. Not one has died in transit and all look healthy and spirited now.

Dr. Lawson is a bird fancier himself and has a very complete aviary in England.

ELECTION TRIALS CONSPIRACY CASE IN COMOX-ATLIN

VANCOUVER, April 6.—On condition that the Attorney-General does not object, His Honor Judge Gayley is going to allow Graham Campbell, Woodford Bird and Fred Gosby to re-elect how they will be tried on charges of conspiracy in election frauds in the Comox-Alberni election.

The three men elected to take jury trial some time ago. Since then Campbell has asked to be tried separately, as one of the other men is said to have turned King's evidence.

"How can I try one man for conspiracy," asked Judge Gayley when Campbell's counsel, G. M. Woodworth asked to be tried separately by his honor.

So long as the three men elected to be tried by the same tribunal and so long as the Attorney-General does not object they are to have the privilege of re-electing.
