MONTREAL, April 5 .- The law of the civil code that "a wife is bliged to live with her husband and to follow him wherever he thinks fit to reside," applies: said Justice Lafontaine, in a ruling in the superior court here, only within the limits of the county of domicile of the couple where they were marriel. Accordingly Clarilda Forgues, w ife of Damien Durivage, is not bound to follow her husband from St. Albert, Russell county, Ontario, to Montreal, where he had gone to live.

Moreover, the husband, it was disclosed in his action against his wife, had fled from Ontario to Montreal to escape liability under a court judgment there eondemning him to pay alimony to his wife.
