Election Petition Filed By Martin O'Reilly in Su reme Court of B.C.

A petition protesting the recent federal election for Skeena constituency, for which Fred Stork was officially declared elected member of Parliament last Monday, was filed in the Supreme Court registry late yesterday afternoon by Martin O'Reilly on grounds that the election was not carried out in compliance with the rules of the Dominion Elections Act by R. W. Cameron, the returning officer. The petition was delivered by Williams, Manson & Gonzales and was addressed to Colonei C. W. Peck and R. W. Cameron. A copy of the petition has been delivered to Mr. Cameron by H. F. Macleod, the court registrar, as required CHANDI WOULD under the act.
