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IMMIGRATION FROM ENGLAND

Dr. Lawson Tells of Desire of People to Come to This Country.

Dr. E. H. Lawson of London, England, the speaker at the Rotary luncheon yesterday afternoon, told of the great desire of the people of England to come to Canada and of the obstacles put in their way.

The doctor practised in Finsbury and he came in touch with many of the lower middle class and the lower classes in London, and he describes their condition as pitiable and even tragical. When people found he was coming to Canada and was interested in the settlement of the Queen Charlotte Islands they inundated him with applications and requests for information in regard to the place and the prospects. Most of the people were turned down by the Canadian immigration office.

Dr. Lawson said he was there to indict the immigration department. They turned away men with sums varying from £200 to £7000 and advised them to go to Australia. The men who were coming to the Queen Charlotte Islands knew the heavy work they would have to do and were prepared to do it.

The speaker said he had been in touch with many important men in connection with the movement and they all favored the scheme. These men included Lord Grey and Lord Curzon. People were coming to this country because they wanted to make good and had nowhere else to go.

He went on to tell that to most of the people in England, B. C. meant Vancouver. That was because the B. C. representatives there told of nothing but Vancouver. If the country were made known there, the immigration to this country would be tremendous among men with capital. They must come to a climate something like Britain. The prospect for the future depended on immigration, and it would be easy to get the people. He urged that people here get in touch with the Canadian immigration authorities and get more sympathetic co-operation with them. With such a distressful condition obtaining in England, people were anxious to come here.
