DOMINION LAYS 40 PER CENT. OF NELSON TO YMIR TRUNK ROAD

NELSON, April 7.—The Dominion Government pays forty per cent. of the cost of the Nelson-Ymir trunk road which is to be built by the Provincial Government. This comes from a grant made by the previous government toward trunk roads throughout the Dominion.

There is fear in some quarters that the whole of the road will not be built this year as promised by supporters of the government. The local newspaper is much perturbed about it and so are opposition leaders. They are saying "I told you so" to those Conservatives who supported the Liberal candidate.
