WAS REGARDED AS PROPHET

Abdul Baha Abbas Was Great Personality — Advocated Brotherhood of Man.

JERUSALEM, Jan. 13.—The death at Haifa, Palestine, recently of Abdul Baha Abbas, founder of the Bahai movement, removes from the Orient a great personality who has long been regarded as a prophet by thousands of followers scattered throughout the Occident as well as in the Near East.

With his death, the movement has passed under the guidance of a committee of 19 representing different religions and races.

Abdul Baha (Servant of God) was 77 years old and his career had been a romantic one. He was exponent of an universal movement whose aim was the realization of the brotherhood of man, and if had gained adherents in Europe, Asia and America and in some parts of these continents huge temples had been erected for the observance of his teachings.

His funeral assumed an international aspect at which were present many notables repre-

Radical Teachings.

At the age of 20, Abdul Baha and his father, Baha Ollah were sent to the penal colony of Acre in Syria because of their radical teachings.

For more than 30 years he suffered the vicissitudes of a political prisoner. He was liberated in 1908 at the earnest solicitation of his followers in all parts of the world. Soon after his release, he started on a long journey which took him to Europe and America and resulted in the swift spreading of his message and gospel.

While in the United States in 1912, he spoke from many Christian pulpits and before many different organizations, schools and colleges. In 1920, he was knighted by Great Britain for his humanitarian work in Syria and for his service for world peace.

Universal Aims.

Bahaiism is a social reform. It aims at the freeing of mankind from religious, social and political yokes of the times,

among the things for which it stands are: universal religion, universal language, a parliament of man with representatives from all countries for the settlement of international disputes, universal education, a perfect civilization founded on simplicity and cooperation and emphasis on the spiritual things of life.

In this world movement which found adherents of almost every religion—Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, Zoroastrianism, Confucianism, Judaism and Christianity. Almost every race and country of the globe contributes adherents to the organization for international brotherhood.

People came to the city of Acre from all parts of the world to see and talk with Abdul Baha Abbas. His home was a regular babel. Within it gathered peoples of all races and creeds.

Creed of Bahaiism.

The creed of Bahaiism is found in this statement by Baha Ollah, its founder:

"We desire but the good of the world and the happiness of the nations; yet they deem us a stirrer up of strife and edition worthy of bondage and banishment, . . . that all nations should become one in faith, and all men as brothers; that the bonds of affection and unity between the sons of men should be strengthened; that diversity of religion should cease, and differences of race be annulled . . . What harm is there in this?"

Yet so it shall be; these fruitless strifes, these ruinous wars shall pass away, and the "Most Great Peace" shall come . . . Is not this that which Christ foretold? . . . Yet do we see your kings and rulers lavishing their treasures more freely on means for destruction of the human race than on that which would conduce to happiness of mankind. The strifes and this bloodshed and discord must cease, and all men be as one kindred and one family. . . . Let not a man glory in this, that he loves his country; let him rather glory in this, that he loves his kind."

DESIRE FOR EASE IS CAUSE OF CRIME**Jail Governor Tells of Congested Condition at Winnipeg.**

WINNIPEG, Jan. 14.—"I think it is just because a bunch of young men want to make an easy living. They peddle dope, bootleg and commit other crimes to avoid working, and get arrested," Governor J. G. Downie advanced this explanation when asked why the provincial jail was in such a congested condition.

Between 120 and 130 prisoners are now quartered in the jail and 40 are living on the prison farm, making a total of 160 to 170 prisoners in custody. Normally the capacity of the jail is 105 prisoners and the extra ones are now being provided for by accommodation in the corridors and passages. Twelve men were transferred to Portage la Prairie and 10 to Brandon recently. Ten more are to be shipped to the latter place, and if the congestion becomes more acute, Portage jail can receive nearly 50 more.

Discharges and transfers keep almost a continual movement of prisoners between the jail and the prison farm, the purpose being to keep the latter institution always filled to capacity.
