ONLY NEWSPRINT AT ELKO PAPER MILL

McDougall Tells Calgary People About Bin Contract in Kootenay

In connection with the announcement of the securing of a contract to build a big pulp and paper mill by the same contractors who are just completing the Government buildings in this city, the Calgary Herald says:

A. C. McDougall, former Calgary alderman, arrived in the city Wednesday from Elko, B.C., where his firm, McDougall-McNeill, Limited, has secured the contract for the erection of a plant for the manufacture of newsprint in large quantities. The complete undertaking, so Mr. McDougall informed a Herald representative, calls for an expenditure of about \$13,000,000 and work on the first unit, which will entail an outlay of \$3,500,000, has already been started. On the completion of this unit, the second will be started.

Take Three Years

The whole project will take about three years and in the construction activities approximately 1,000 men will be employed. It was quite likely, Mr. McDougall stated, that many of these would be obtained in Calgary and that thus the unemployment situation could be helped since the work would be carried on in the fall and winter of this year.

After the unit was completed 1,000 men would be engaged in its operation and the finished plant would employ about 3,000 men, or 1,000 for each unit.

Big Production Capacity

Mr. Dougall said that each unit would have a production capacity of 100 tons of newsprint a day or 300 tons when the three units were finished. This would make it, he believed the largest newsprint manufactory in Canada.

Combined Canadian and American capital was behind the enterprise but Canadian directors would be in majority on the board.

Limits had been secured which ensured production for at least 30 years.


Elko is in Southern British Columbia, not far from Nelson, and is served by the Canadian Pacific railway and the Great Northern railway. The Elk and Bull rivers furnish ample water power and one of the first undertakings in connection with the plant will be the building of a large power dam which in itself will require 35,000 cubic yards of concrete. The buildings will be of modern design and will be constructed of reinforced concrete.

For Canada and U.S.

Only newsprint and pulp will be manufactured and the product is intended for the use of Canadian and United States newspapers.

Mr. McDougall admitted modestly that his firm had been successful in securing the largest contract for plant construction in Canada in the face of keen American competition. He is also engaged at present in the construction of a \$750,000 sanitarium at Essendale, B.C., near New Westminster, which makes \$5,500,000 work now going on, with more than \$7,000,000 more assured. He is the president and general manager of the company and J. H. McNeill, another Calgarian, is the vice-president and superintendent.
