TWO MONTHS IN SUNNY SOUTH

Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Bazzett-Jones Saw Former Rupert People—Los Angeles Great City.

A. E. Bazzett-Jones, maintenance engineer at the Canadian National Shipyard here, who returned with Mrs. Bazzett-Jones on Wednesday from a two months' holiday trip to California, tells of having met several former Prince Rupert people who are now thriving in business in the sunny southern state.

Harvey E. Peck, who formerly conducted the Family Shoe Store, is doing well in Los Angeles where he runs the Cordova Hotel, a first class 120 room establishment which caters to the best custom. It was at this hotel that Mr. and Mrs. Bazzett-Jones stayed while they were in the California metropolis. Besides the hotel Mr. Peck owns two large apartment blocks and is a principal shareholder in a producing oil well. Mrs. Peck is also in Los Angeles. She took up moving picture acting for a short time as a recreation.

Mr. and Mrs. G. E. Bainter are established at Long Beach, where Mr. Bainter is again in the insurance and real estate business. Although he is doing well in the south he still considers that Prince Rupert was one of the best places he was ever in. He sent his regards to his many friends here.

Barber Doing Well.
J. J. Alexander, former proprietor of the Empire Baths here, is located at Anaheim, a town about 40 miles from Los Angeles. Mr. Alexander is running a general store at Yerbalinda, nine miles from Anaheim. He is doing well and has made some good investments since he went to California.

Mr. Bazzett-Jones also visited at Long Beach Mr. Custer, father of Miss Custer, who was formerly in the millinery business in this city. Mr. Custer is said to be a very wealthy man and is interested in the oil business. Among others whom Mr. Bazzett-Jones met were W. A. Williams, formerly superintendent of the Anox smelter, who is in the machinery commission business at Los Angeles; J. L. Mull, formerly of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co., and Joe Rorzic, formerly accountant in Frizzell's market, Mr. Mull is in Los Angeles from Pittsburg "looking around" on private business.

Much Driving.
Mr. and Mrs. Bazzett-Jones were away exactly two months and in the course of their trip visited Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco, Portland and Seattle. The most of the time was spent driving through various parts of California state and they were also at Riverside and Pasadena.

They went south from Seattle by the Southern Pacific Railway on account of the bad weather that was prevailing on the coast which made boat travel not the most comfortable. From Benicia to Port Acosta on San Francisco Bay they crossed on the biggest railway ferry in the world which had aboard at the time 29 passenger coaches and five locomotives. Arriving at Oakland they crossed again on another ferry into San Francisco.

Roads Are Fine.
"The roads of California are wonderful," said Mr. Bazzett-Jones. "Not only are the main roads splendid but also the side roads which branch here and there in all directions through the country where oranges may

be seen growing in all stages of ripeness with blossoms and fruit on the same trees. There was a lot of fine sunshine but we were also there during the rainy season and there were a number of floods."

Mr. Bazzett-Jones says that the grape growers of California have been making three times as much money since prohibition came into effect as they did before. During the war and since prohibition many of the vineyards were top up by the owners who believed that the business was done. This was one reason why the price of raisins went so high. However, the most of the growers are planting again. He saw one orchard of 3,000 acres planted entirely in grapes. The California grape does not grow on a high vine, as is generally believed, but instead on a short bush.

Fast Auto Trip.
Mr. and Mrs. Bazzett-Jones made a flying trip from Los Angeles to San Diego. The distance of 175 miles was made in five hours, an average of 35 miles an hour including stops at all railway crossings and for refreshment. Some times they travelled at as high a speed as 50 miles an hour which justifies as to the excellence of the roads. "Los Angeles is enjoying a real building boom," said Mr. Bazzett-Jones. "Building is going on there in every direction and includes first class houses, apartment blocks, factories and other industrial plants.

"It is the only non-union city in the United States and there never was a union there until just a few months ago when an overall factory, which was compelled to employ union men, came in. There was strong objection generally in the city to the establishing of the union.

"Traffic is more congested in Los Angeles than in New York, according to statistics every seventh person in the city owns a car, this being based on the entire population including women and children. So great is the congestion down town that many people never bring their cars into the centre of the city at all but leave them blocks away in the residential section and walk the rest of the way."
"The streets are strangely arranged and one is apt to lose his bearings especially in the residential section."

Saw Movie Stars.
Mr. and Mrs. Bazzett-Jones saw a great many movie-stars on the streets of Los Angeles. They dress extravagantly and, in fact, overdress. Furs are all the fashion although they are really

ALD. PERRY EARLY ON JOB; NOTICE OF MOTIONS TO COUNCIL

Asks Adoption Double Platoon System, Reduction Light Rail, Connection Septic Tank.

Ald. Perry at last night's council meeting gave notice of the following motions which he will present at the meeting on Monday, January 30:

- (1) That the city council adopt the double platoon system by the addition of another fireman in the fire department and that provision be made for the change in the 1922 estimates.
- (2) That leave be granted for the introduction of a bylaw for the reduction of light and power rates as recommended by the superintendent of utilities and left in abeyance by the council last year.
- (3) That the city engineer be instructed to prepare estimates of the cost of connecting that portion of Section 6 west of Green Street on Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Avenues with the Booth Memorial School septic tank, the cost of the work to be carried out under local improvement.

C., on or before March 31, 1922.

Blank forms upon which to submit applications may be obtained from the District Foresters at the above named places or from the Department of Lands at Victoria.

The grazing of livestock on the Crown range without permit constitutes trespass, prohibited by law.
