SAXON INVADERS HAD RHEUMATISM

Skeletons Just Dug up in Dover Hills of Men Who Went to Britain Before Romans

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Two skeletons, one complete, the other incomplete, were found in the chalk of Wrotham Hill during the rebuilding of the London to Dover road, which is one of the Ministry of Transport's schemes for providing work for the unemployed. These skeletons were submitted to Sir Arthur Keith, the great authority on bones. Sir Arthur reported that the complete skeleton was that of a strongly built man whose death was due to rheumatism; while in the case of the incomplete skeleton he declared that paralysis was the cause of death.

Until further evidence is forthcoming he conjectured that the bones were those of early Saxon invaders who came before the Romans, and he thought it likely that in the excavation a corner of a pre-Christian Saxon graveyard might have been brought to light. Recently another skeleton has been discovered, and the bones are still in a hut at Wrotham. In this case there was no question of rheumatism or paralysis being responsible for a poor Saxon's death. The skull has a hole about an inch wide, and a rusty metal knife was found too.

PRIZES GIVEN FOR MACKEREL CATCHES

Better Packing and Grading in Sweden With Selling Campaign.

GOTHENBURG, Sweden, Nov. 2.—Sweden is making a determined effort to stimulate the deep-sea fishing industry of the West Coast, and at the same time to increase the national consumption of fish throughout the country. The state and local authorities are helping and encouraging fishermen in the purchasing of new boats and fishing tackle, and they are constructing up-to-date fishing ports. The government fisheries board is extending its research work on the habits of the fish and the whereabouts of the largest schools. A campaign to stimulate the public demand for fish as a more important part of the daily fare has been inaugurated, and certain newspapers are calling attention to the exploitation of fishermen by the middlemen. The latter are taking large profits the majority of which should go into the pockets of the fishermen, or be shared by the public in lower prices.

Best Fish Caught

An interesting feature of this drive is the revival by the government of a custom nearly one hundred years old of granting prizes to the mackerel fishermen of the West Coast for the best mackerel caught, sorted and packed for export.

Swedish fishermen take pride in their profession and they have long been grumbling over the fact that their mackerel has been sold and shipped to America through middlemen in other countries. They have received reports that mackerel of inferior grades has been mixed in with these shipments.
In order to eliminate this cause of complaint, and to assure better quality and direct shipment with the virtual elimination of middlemen's profits, a co-operative association has been formed and backed by the Governor of the Gothenburg Province, Oscar von Sydow, the Swedish Consul-General in New York, Olof H. Lamm, and others. The system of government inspection has been perfected, in-
