In Saturday's Daily News were published several compilations of figures summarizing various activities and happenings in the city for the year 1921. Today more are being published. All give satisfactory and gratifying statistics as to the present progress and condition of Prince Rupert. The report of a bumper year in the landing of halibut, which is such an important industry to the city, surprised many readers who did not realize the great size of this business. The figures conclusively place Prince Rupert as the leading halibut fishing port in the world. Figures on building here showed a healthy increase in this line and included several important structures, such as the court house, the station and the ocean dock.
