NUTS GALORE COME IN WITH THE TIDE

Victoria People Flock to Beaches and Gather Harvest But Are Disappointed.

VICTORIA, Aug. 25.—Seldom if ever in the history of this port has the sea, that conveyor of strange burdens, carried a more fantastic cargo than came rolling in from the Straits supported by a stiff southwesterly wind. Bobbing and dancing on the crest of the waves approaching the shore from Dallas Road to Oak Bay at daybreak yesterday came millions of walnuts as a gift from the sea.

Youngsters were the first to discover the strange invasion and reported the find to their parents. Parents telephoned relatives and so the word was carried, until ten o'clock in the morning saw several hundred people on the shores. They came walking and trundling wheelbarrows piled high with sacks.

Animated Juveniles.

As a sack was filled two youngsters were detailed to remove it, and long streams of animated juveniles dragging sackfuls of walnuts to their homes proceeded all day. In the evening the nut gatherers were joined by their elders in greater numbers and these scenes were re-enacted with redoubled intensity.

Passing in tally-ho's, sightseers stopped in amazement at the strange sight of countless dozens of people picking walnuts from the tangled masses of kelp on the sea shore. Tally-ho drivers, never slow to seize an opportunity, enlarged upon the occasion, it is said, to point out what the wonderful climate of Victoria would do for even the seaweed growing at its shores.

Budding financiers, ranging from ten years of age to tots of four, sat pencil in hand figuring out how rich they would be after they had detailed the host of walnuts, they had collected. Grave and respected parents doffed their boots and rolled up their nether garments to paddle in the water the better to get

at the bobbing harvest.

Opportunists, not wishing to lose a moment, lit fires on the beach then and there and roasted dozens of the walnuts for immediate consumption. In short it looked like being a gala day for all concerned until a hideous doubt presented itself to the harvesters: Were the walnuts safe to eat?

Cloud on Horizon.

The first cloud on the horizon of the nut-gatherers came with the arrival of The Times which stated that a shipment of 1,000 sacks of diseased walnuts had been refused entry at the port on Thursday. Previous to this many of the walnuts had been opened, and while some were found to be beyond hope as food, others were to be seen in a fair state of preservation.

It is estimated by spectators that over 100 sacks of the defective and worm-infested cargo were salvaged before their condition was found out. With two and three sacks of walnuts in their cellars many of the nut-gatherers now face the alternative of disposing of their prize as garbage or burning it for fuel.

The only serious consideration of the incident lay in the fact that many children ate large quantities of the nuts in all good faith, and illness may yet result.
