LABOR AND HOSPITAL MATTERS TAKEN UP BY T. AND L. COUNCIL

The Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council held its regular fortnightly meeting in the Carpenters' Hall on Tuesday night. President S. D. Macdonald was in the chair and the attendance was not as large as usual although six or seven unions were represented. Labor questions in the district generally were discussed and it was decided to communicate with Hon. James Murdock, Dominion minister, and Hon. A. M. Manson, provincial minister, in connection with certain conditions which are said to exist particularly in regard to scales of wages being paid.

The McDermid resolution from the Union of B.C. municipalities respecting the matter of hospital finances was presented at the meeting but was not endorsed. The council decided to remain by its own proposal for a commission to be appointed with an open mind to investigate conditions and bring in a report for the government on the most feasible plan for hospital reforms. The McDermid resolution calls for a \$15 a head general tax on all for hospital purposes.
