

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THE PACT RATIFIED

The Anglo-Canadian trade pact was ratified last week by both the British and Canadian Parliaments and is now law. It was the final consummation of the arrangements made at the Imperial Economic Conference and is an experiment that will be watched with great interest. Canadians generally will try to help make it successful, we feel sure. Should it prove beneficial, as everyone hopes it will. it will be adopted as a principle in this country, in spite of the opposition that has been shown to it during its passage through each of the Parliaments. It may have weaknesses, as it doubtless has, but, if it is beneficial, Canadians will be for it. Whatever else it may do, it should make our neighbors look on us with greater respect than in the past and consider well before putting in force any hostile mea- Lowe (Card) sures.
