KITSUMGALLUM BRANCH

Terrace, B. C. Editor Daily News:

A recent issue of the News contained a report of the meeting of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade at which it was proposed to send a delegation to Ottawa to press forward the requirements of the western portion of Central, B. C.

The construction of branch lines, as feeders for the C.N.R. were proposed to the Copper River Francois Lake, Stuart Lake and to the Groundhog coal area, but so far as I have learned, no branch was advocated for your nearest valley, the Kitsumgallum.

The Kitsumgallum Valley, stretching northward from Terrace to the Naas offers an easy grade and is probably the best route for a railroad to the Northern Interior.

The valley lands are fertile and hot subject to summer frosts. Anthracite coal outcroppings indicate an extensive coal area. Mineral prospects yield free gold and native silver while the most desirable of fluids, petroleum, percolates through in sufficient quantities to justify the opinion that it will shortly add its wealth to that of the district.

Is there a valley in Central B. C. offering more potential wealth or a better place to commence a branch line to tap the almost unknown resources of Northern B. C.?
