The bride and groom left shortly after for their new home in the Lakelse Valley.

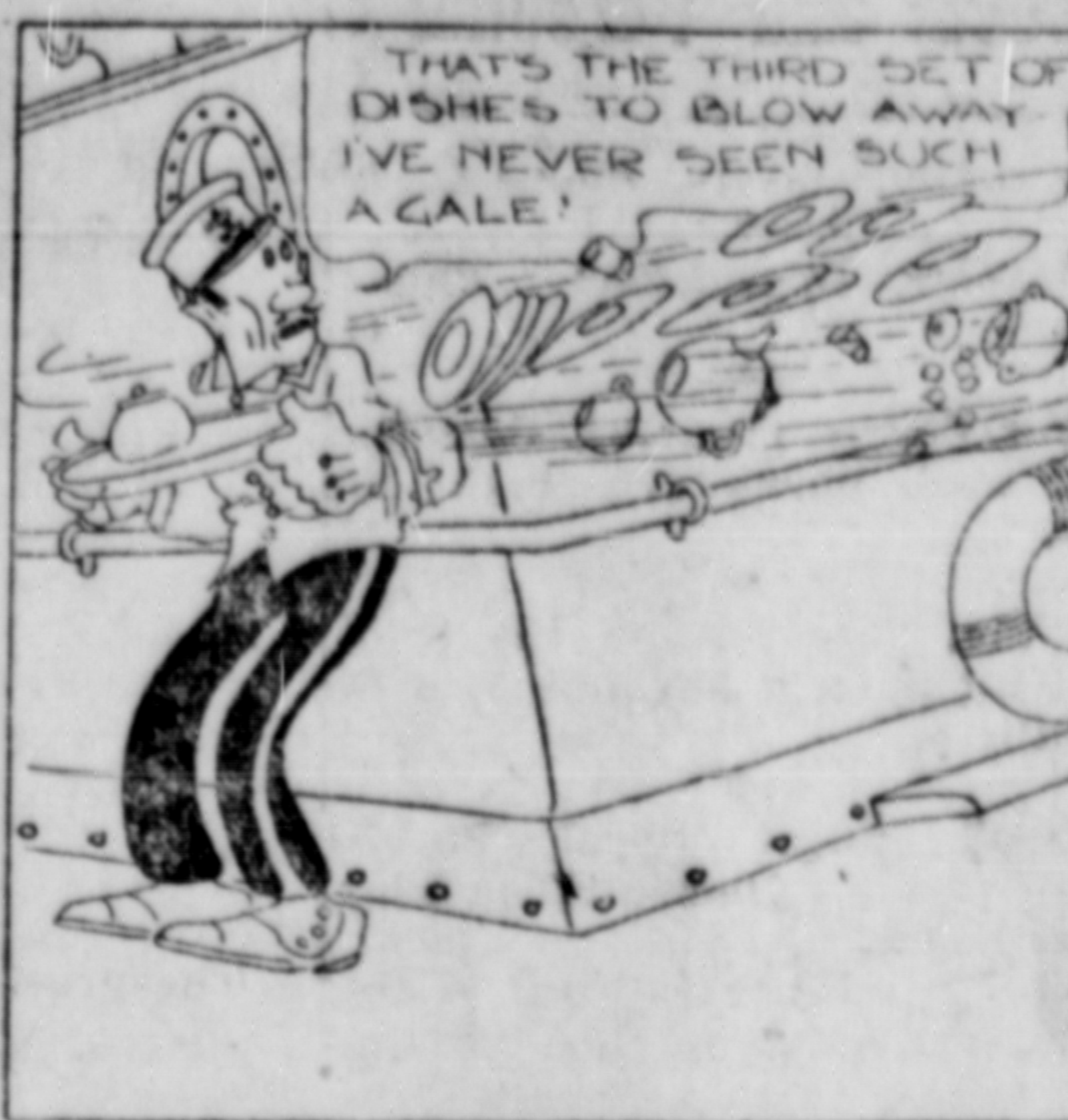
