QUEEN CHARLOTTE

J. H. Gray, B.G.L.S., paid a visit to Meyer Lake returning to Prince Rupert on the steamer Prince Albert.

Rev. J. Gillett has been appointed to have charge of the District Exhibit, from the North end of Queen Charlotte Islands, at the Prince Rupert Fair.

Mr. Ley, formerly of the West Coast of Vancouver Island, has been appointed teacher of Massett school.

Contractor Arthur Robertson completed the work of clearing the log jams, on the Yakoun River, which will allow the salmon to ascend to the large lake, in the interior of the island.

Work was resumed at the crab cannery, at Naden Harbor, under the supervision of Mr. Simpson, manager. It is expected that thirty employees will be engaged during the winter months.

It is estimated Massett inlet produced over two million of salmon, during the run of pinks. The Coho run is now in progress, with trawlers catching up to two hundred fish each day. In a short time the Chum salmon fishing will commence. The three island canneries will have full packs.

A Columbia River boat, being towed to Buckley Bay, by the launch Edenshaw, broke away in Hecate Straits, last week and is still adrift. The Edenshaw carried 16,000 Pinks to Wales Island cannery, a short time ago, the result of one night's fishing, in upper Massett Inlet.

It is understood a weekly freight boat will be engaged, to run between Buckley Bay and Prince Rupert, in the near future. A petition is in circulation to have the entrance to Massett Inlet and DeKalba Bay deepened, in order to admit larger vessels to the waterways of Graham Island.

A seine boat, manned by eight white men, is credited with catching over four hundred thousand Pink salmon during the run extending over twenty days, on Massett Inlet. The native seine boats caught over two hundred thousand fish, in the boat, during the season.

Harriet Wesley, a young native woman, of Skidegate, passed away, on the 7th instant, at her home. The deceased was ill for many years, and was a great favorite in the native village where her sister and relatives reside.

A large number of gasoline launches, owned by the Massett Indians, left Massett on the 8th inst., for Prince Rupert. With the passengers on the steamer Prince Albert the islands will be well represented at the Rupert Fair.

After spending the summer vacation on the Prairies, Miss Rita Martin returned to Massett on the last trip of the steamer Prince John.

Dr. Dunn contemplates extensive alterations and repairs, to

the Queen's Hotel, at Massett. An additional story will be added, for the purpose of accommodating the large number of tourists, and others, sojourning on Massett Inlet.

Dr. E. A. Lawson, manager of the Queen Charlotte Island Resources, Ltd., is building a residence and office, at Massett.

Few forest fires occurred in the Queen Charlotte Islands during the dry season, although the records show the prevalence of exceptionally dry weather. Forest Warden Williams attended to all calls for assistance, and stopped several fires before they assumed dangerous dimensions.

The children of the Anglican Sunday Schools, of Port Clements and Buckley Bay, were treated to a series of picnics during the summer vacation. The "Western Hope" was used to convey the picnicers to the grounds, where they were entertained by Mrs. J. Gillett and the Anglican clergyman, Rev. J. Gillett. The children enjoyed the outing immensely.

Mate Matthews, who was under treatment, at Massett for a wound alleged to have been inflicted on one of the whaling steamers, returned to duty, last week, having recovered sufficiently to again take his position on the steamer.

During his stay on Graham Island, Rev. Peter Kelly conducted services at Skidegate and Massett. He also favored the Indians with several songs, at concerts held on the reserves.

At an entertainment, held in the Town Hall, at Massett, on the 9th instant, the following ladies and gentlemen took part: Alfred Adams, Henry Edenshaw, Mrs. David Parnell, Amanda Bell, Ernest Brown, David Jones, David Bell, William Matthews, Mrs. Florence Davidson. The hall was decorated with flowers and flags, while tables were arranged for the guests. Rev. Peter Kelly added to the pleasure of the evening, by singing several solos.

The surrendered bonds will be forwarded by banks to the Minister of Finance at Ottawa, where they will be exchanged for bonds of the new issue, in fully registered, or coupon registered or coupon bearer form carrying interest payable 1st May and 1st November of each year of the duration of the loan, the first interest payment accruing and payable 1st May, 1923. Bonds of the new issue will be sent to the banks for delivery immediately after the receipt of the surrendered bonds.

The bonds of the maturing issue which are not converted under this proposal will be paid off in cash on the 1st December, 1922.

IN THE SUPREME COURT OF BRITISH COLUMBIA IN PROBATE.


In the Matter of the Administration Act, and In the Matter of the Estate of George Crook Doughty, Deceased, Intestate.
