canned products an advantage over those of all other countries including United States and Japan. This preferential tariff amounted to some 75c difference on Canadian pinks over American. This the United States was very anxious to overcome for they were keen to get the French trade. In order to meet the desired end they were going to come here this year and buy pinks at an increased price thus establishing a higher price than Canadian canners would otherwise have to pay. They would only buy a small proportion of their fish here, just sufficient to set the high price here, and then they would go back to Alaska and buy the most of their own fish caught there at much lower prices than were paid here. Thus they intended to wipe out the 75c per case advantage given by tariff to Canadian fish in France.

"It is quite a cute trick and it looks as if it will work," observed Major Motherwell.

Spring Run Not Good.

Speaking of fishing conditions to date Major Motherwell stated the run of springs on the Skeena had not been very good although the Naas had been fair until quite recently.

The sockeye season opened last night and the canners would be putting up fish from now on right to the close of the season. All fifteen canneries on the Skeena were operating this season fishing for them all having started today. The boats of North Pacific cannery were the only one that had reported up to this morning. Only one or two fish had been taken to a boat but these boats had been close

in. Better information from the boats going further out would probably be available by tomorrow.

Major Motherwell stated that he would be back in the district again next month to make his annual inspection with the local inspector. At that time the entire district would be covered.

Many Official Visits.

"We expect to be busy this summer around Prince Rupert for many official visits are to be paid," said Major Motherwell. "Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of fisheries, and his deputy minister, Alex. Johnstone, or the assistant deputy, W. A. Found, are expected.

"The sub-committee of Marine and Fisheries will also be investigating here, it is understood. William Duff, member for Lunenburg, the chairman, is expected to conduct an examination of conditions on this coast together with the B. C. members of the committee, Fred Stork, A. W. Neill and W. G. McQuarrie.

"J. A. Todd, superintendent of fish culture for the Dominion, is also expected from Ottawa in the course of the season."

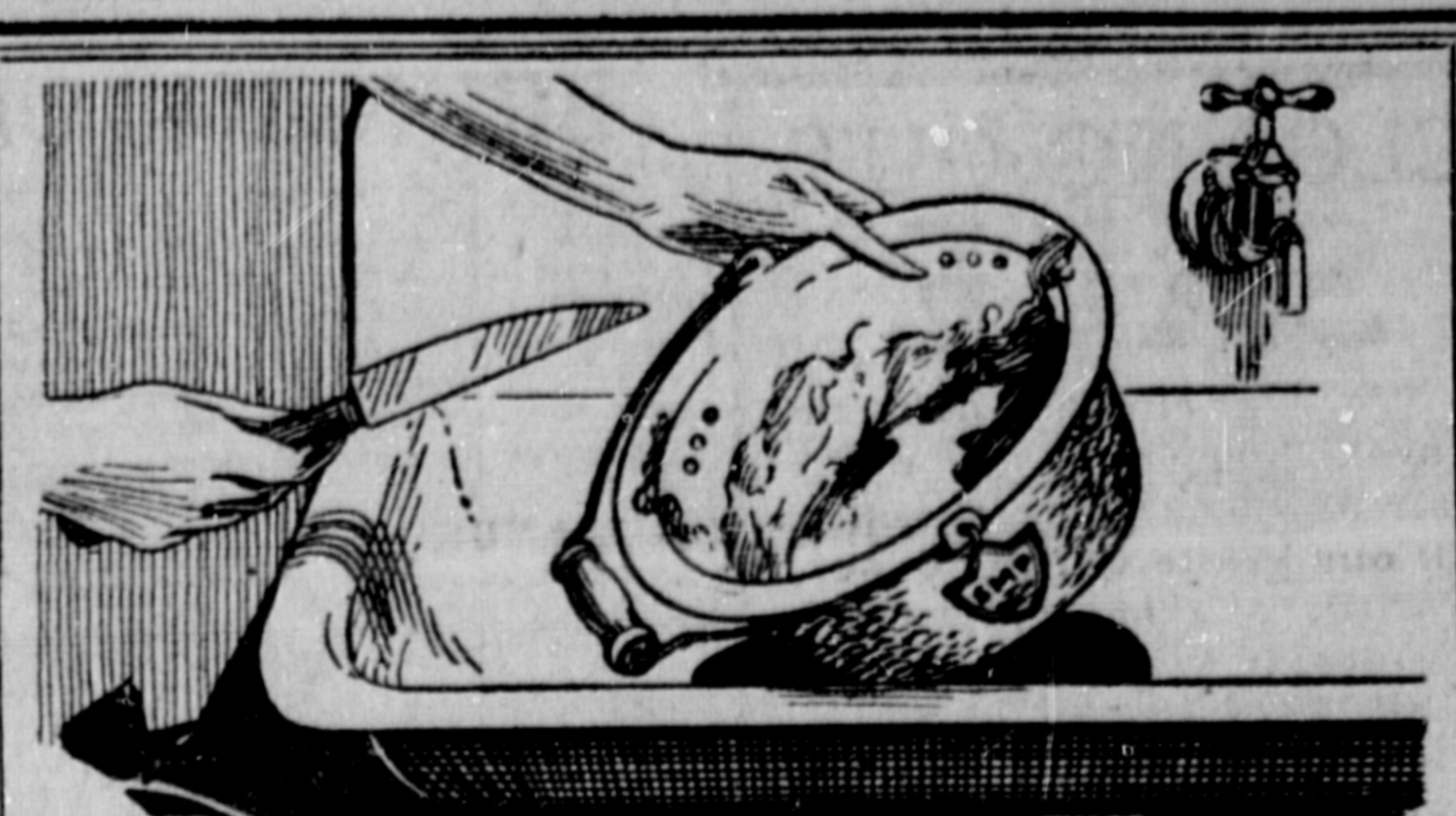
