CANDIDATES FOR CIVIC ELECTION TELL IDEAS IN BRIEF INTERVIEWS

roadway and far the surface. Also I would favor taking up the bylaw, which was advanced by the Board of Works in 1921, to run the line of street improvements along Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Avenues and through to Seal Cove. If the incinerator bylaw carries it will be up to the next council to install it as early as possible in the most economical location. I consider also that negotiations with the Canadian National Railway should be taken up with a view to open up Seventh Street to the waterfront according to the original plans of the townsite."

Mrs. E. C. Kirkpatrick.

Mrs. Elizabeth C. Kirkpatrick: "I would have to go into things first with the city council before I could form any idea as to general policies or what would be the biggest question to be dealt with by the city council in 1922."

"However, I consider we must have better streets and I would like to see the electric power brought within the reach of everyone who desires to use electricity for domestic purposes."

"I know lots of people who would like to use electricity for cooking purposes if it were obtainable at reasonable rates. In connection with the better street question I consider it is very necessary to keep within the bounds of economical expenditure. I do not wish to criticize the work that has already been done in this connection."

Herbert Hampton.

Herbert Hampton: "I put in my nomination papers for alderman at the last minute after several people had approached me to do so and your questions are somewhat of a surprise, as I have not had time to consider things thoroughly."

"I can tell you, however, that I am running for the betterment of the city both morally and materially. I would advocate strict economy in all departments and a square deal to all. As I am not acquainted with the doings of the previous city council I am unable to go into any details. I am certainly of the opinion that any work undertaken by the city in future should be of a permanent character."

Theo. Collart.

Theo. Collart: "Your first question covers a little too wide a range for me to answer off hand. My idea about the whole thing is to spend the city money in the right way, that is, get as much for the money spent as possible, embodying efficiency and economy. That is my platform. One of the greatest questions I consider is the question of sewers, and, of course, the general improvement of the streets. I believe in getting away from the plank roads as much as possible."

James Black.

James Black: "In reply to your first question I consider the question of electric power to be most important. If we are going to have any grain elevators we will have to have power and unless we can get an arrangement with the dry dock we will have to be in a position to furnish it ourselves. In reply to your second question about policies, I will be guided by the ideas of the Trades and Labor Council which have been put before the public. The Trades and Labor Council are endorsing me and it will be up to me to carry out their wishes."

Rod McLeod.

R. A. McLeod: "In answer to your first question I consider that probably the matter hydro-electric power will be the biggest question. There is one thing I will say and that is if this question comes up I will support it unless anyone can convince me to the contrary. In regard to general policies, one of my strong points is a trunk roadway from end to end of the city of a permanent nature. I would like to see this so that people could travel in safety on one street from end to end of the city. The bye streets should follow in the same manner."

"Anybody who has lived in this town as long as I have will know that more sewers are wanted in the worst way. Their extension will have my support, because from a sanitary standpoint, sewers are urgently required."

Ald. C. C. Perry

Ald. C. C. Perry: "I consider

the biggest thing that can be done at the present time is for the public bodies to co-operate, and instead of spending so much time and energy seeking the unattainable, direct their time and energies to seeking the attainable. A strong bond between the Board of Trade and the city council would be one of the biggest things I could wish for in the coming year. I think that better facilities for the accommodation of the fishermen and for the development of the city in general in the way of better roads of a permanent nature, etc., should be embodied in future policies.

"One important matter that strikes me is that the Court of Revision should give very careful consideration to conditions surrounding assessment so as to arrive, if possible, at a fair and equitable basis of value of properties, with a view to ascertaining true values and arriving at a fair assessment."

"Another question of importance is that of a public sewerage system. We should bend our energies in the direction of giving the people a better sewerage system, but there must be better co-operation between the people and the council in this regard. The city provides laterals leading from dwellings to the main sewer system and expects that the residents will connect with those laterals. The property owners should not allow a plumbing bill to stand in the way of making the connection for it would bring about more desirable sanitary conditions in the city."

"The question of electric power and the hospital are other big questions to be dealt with. I consider the hospital affairs should be gone into very thoroughly with a view to getting better support for this worthy institution from the provincial government. The power question is one everybody is familiar with. It is very necessary to increase our present capacity in this connection."

Ald. J. H. Kelly.

Ald. J. H. Kelly: "In my opinion the biggest questions are the questions of permanent roads and sewers. My idea would be to map out a program of permanent improvements which could go on from year to year so that each succeeding city council could carry on with it. This is a matter which should be thrashed out at the very beginning. I think that certain appropriations should be laid aside each year for playgrounds and parks so that some work could be carried on year by year of a permanent nature."

W. H. Montgomery.

W. H. Montgomery: "The biggest questions I think will probably be those of tax reduction and power. It seems to me that the cost of electric light in the city should be reduced in view of the fact that this department made a profit of something like \$32,000 last year. As to general policies I consider that all city improvements should be along permanent lines."

Police Commissioners.

To the candidates for Police Commissioners the questions were put: "What, in your opinion, will be the biggest question or questions to be dealt with by the police commission in 1922?" and "What, if anything, have you to say in regard to general policies?"

George M. Sutherland.

George M. Sutherland said: "I consider the 'blind piggers' in the city should be cleaned up and that all the undesirable should be kept on Comox Avenue. I consider the general policies of the police commissioners should be to keep the undesirable out of the city altogether and to see that no one of foreign birth, either male or female, of undesirable character, is permitted to land at this port at all. I am not positive of the truth of this condition, but it seems to me that American women can come into this country, after having been put out of the States for various reasons, and yet Canadian women cannot land in the States unless under special and strict immigration laws. Therefore, I consider the restrictions for foreigners landing in this port should be tightened."

George Leek.

George Leek said: "I consider economy together with efficiency should govern the work and administration of the police commission. I think at this time that it is a little too soon to state what the biggest question

before the police commission in 1922 will be."

E. H. Shockley: "In view of the great readjustments which are taking place with the return to peace conditions and the expected prosperity and consequent growth of the city, the police commissioners will have grave problems confronting them during the coming year. These problems will have to be dealt with fairly and justly. My object would be to have the policing of the city done in an economical manner as possible as long as the efficiency of the force is not impaired."
