**HOCKEY IS UNDER WAY**

New York Rangers and Detroit Falcons Win Games—Bruins and Maple Leafs Draw

MONTREAL, Nov. 14.—The National Hockey League season got under way Thursday night with games at Montreal, Toronto and Chicago. The New York Rangers took the measure of the Montreal Maroons here by a score of 4 to 2.

The Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs failed, despite overtime, to break a one-all draw. The game was played at Toronto.

The Detroit Falcons had no trouble defeating the Chicago Black Hawks 3 to 1 on Detroit ice. Saturday night's scores were as follows:

**BADMINTON TIME TABLE**

Prince Rupert Badminton Association Games Start Tonight

The theory of the Prince Rupert Badminton Association permits each of four clubs taking part to play home and home games with the opposing teams at some time during the life of the league. Each club will have a complement of six teams play, viz., two men's doubles, two ladies' doubles and two mixed doubles. On the night of play one team of men's doubles, one team of ladies and one team of mixed will remain "at home" to receive visitors while the other three teams from that club will be playing another "at home" team on their courts. This means that each club will send away for the evening as many players as they receive. For the purpose of identification the teams will be numbered one and two and number one teams of each club will be matched against number one teams of the opposing clubs and similarly with teams number two.

Some of the clubs will have teams entered in both "A" and "B" Divisions. In his event it is understood that "E" players can only be used to relieve players in "A" Division once without losing their status in the "B" Division—viz., if they play more than one as "A" League players, they cannot return to the "B" League during the life of this schedule.

Special arrangements have been made with Skeena Club, owing to the club having but one court and a very large membership desiring to use it on their limited nights of play, that games on their court will start at 7:00 p.m. and be over by 8:00 p.m. or very shortly thereafter. In this connection arrangements are being made that the ladies will either play their games with the Skeena Club on the afternoon of the same day or play some other night, but the men's doubles and mixed doubles will be played between 7:00 and 8:00 p.m.

Home teams will furnish the shuttles for the games. Necessity for referee is optional with the opposing teams.

It is also understood that insofar as possible clubs will not double their men and women for the mixed games but play separate players, viz., six men and six women; viz., three men away and three at home, and similarly with the ladies.

Scores will be one point for each game won but, in case of a rubber

won in two straight games, the third game is not to be scored, and should be reported to the secretary of the Prince Rupert Badminton Association, G. P. Lyons, who will keep the progressive standing of the clubs.

While each club will, of course, endeavor to win its games, the purpose of this league is to foster and improve the game of badminton and sportsmanship throughout by the member clubs is essential to its success:

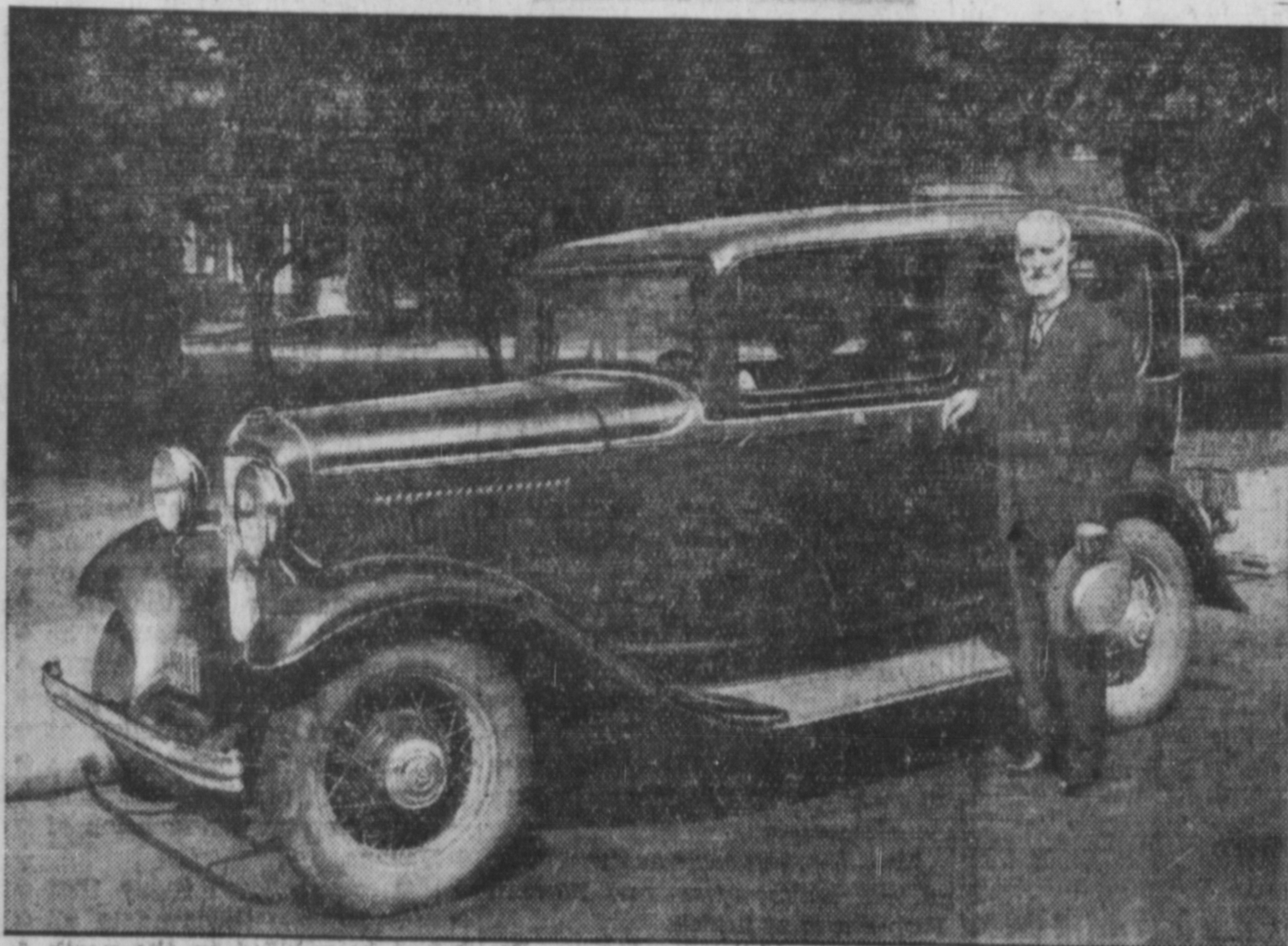

**FINDS LONG DRIVE EASY WITH FORD V-8**



MR. AND MRS. HENRI MILETTE of Outremont, a Montreal suburb, are well advanced in years, but long distance touring in their new Ford V-8 fails to fatigue them. Mr. Milette has been a resident of Outremont for 30 years, is chairman of the Catholic School Board, a member of the Board of Assessors and a Justice of the Peace. He was alderman for six years.

Recently Mr. and Mrs. Milette returned to Montreal from a tour to Laurel, Maryland. The 620-mile drive

required only 1½ days. After a day's rest, the return trip was started. Leaving the Maryland city at 7 a. m. Mr. Milette drove 524 miles to Malone, New York, arriving at 11 p. m. "If I had not had two ladies with me, I would have pushed on to Montreal, arriving at 2 a. m.," writes Mr. Milette. "I drove the 524 miles without tiring."

Mr. Milette reported gasoline consumption had averaged 22 miles per imperial gallon, although most of the trip was accomplished at speeds

of from 55 to 60 miles an hour. Only one quart of oil and one quart of water were consumed in the entire 1,300-mile round trip.

"I drove as the roads would permit at 55 to 60 miles an hour and could not see that I was forcing the engine any more than at 35 to 40 miles an hour. The car would climb hills at the same high speed possible on the level. Everything went smoothly with no trouble of any kind. I did not even have to replace the air in the tires."
