Mayor H. B. Rochester, who has been attending the Good Roads League convention as well as that of the Union of B.C. Municipalities at Kamloops, is expected home tomorrow morning on the steamer Prince George.

The report of the finance committee on Fourth and Fifth Avenue water mains was laid over for a week by the city council last night pending the receipt of tenders for gas iron, steel and wooden pipe which have been called for.

Further consideration in committee of the whole by the city council of the amending bylaw to the building bylaw was laid over for a week last night pending the return of the report on the fire limits which was sent back to the building commission.

A report from the building commission recommending that the present fire limits be divided into two sections was last night referred back to the commission by the council. The view was taken that alterations had been made in the report that had not the full sanction of the commission.

The city council last night decided to lay over the opening of the Hays Creek bridge tenders until November 7. On this date the tenders will be definitely opened after several postponements. Another by-law for the Hays Creek bridge will be submitted at the municipal election in January.

A report from the Board of Works recommending that the complaint of N. Tomashensky regarding the flooding of his basement be turned over to the school board was last night adopted by the city council. It was pointed out that the water in question had come from the King Edward school.

A request from W. T. Muse asking the city to sell him five spruce logs and 2500 feet of hemlock piling from the city's Smith Island quarry property was last night granted by the council. Mr. Muse intends to use the timber in the event of his obtaining the contract for the building of the float at Osland Park.
