five Association, of which Leonard Peterson, Annieville, is the president. Nine resolutions to present to the Royal Fisheries Commission, were drawn up.

These resolutions embody the following: (1) Opposition to the closing of the Fraser River for fishing; (2) upholding the actions of the authorities in limiting fishing licenses to whites and Indians; (3) abolishment of traps and seines of all kinds; (4) one license for all B. C. waters and the use of gas boats wherever fishing is permitted; (5) if not abolishment of lines then abolishment of seine districts (B. C. has 21 seine districts and a license for each costs \$300); (6) abolishment of cannery license fee of \$500, to be substituted with a case tax; (7) better care of salmon fry and a study of the Oregon system of retaining ponds; (8), a board in B. C. to deal with fisheries problems and to present them to the minister, with recommendations; (9), absolute opposition to an embargo on the export of all raw fish.
