## ACCUSING MAYOR OF ATTEMPT TO STIFLE UTILITIES FACTS, ALD. PERRY BOLTS COUNCIL CHAMBER.

can replied that he was not quite clear on the subject as to how the utilities department would be affected by the auditor's report. He was quite satisfied that the utilities department had made profits that had not been credited to it. The question was: If the auditor's report passed would the council have the power to transfer to the Utilities Committee funds that had not been credited to it and had been taken into general funds? In the last three years the utilities had earned \$86,000 in surplus. Of this \$71,000 had been taken to general fund. Construction to the amount of \$43,000 out of the earnings had been done and the utility had not been credited but had been debited.

Ald. Montgomery said it was all a matter of surplus. He thought a commission or auditor could make a report showing the true. On motion of Ald. McLeod and status of the utilities.

Ald. Montgomery the committee arose and the auditor's report was adopted.

### Duncan Report

The following is Mr. Duncan's report on the utilities as later submitted:

"At a joint meeting of the finance and utilities committees held on Tuesday evening, May 2, the light department finances were discussed at length. The object of this meeting was to determine the financial position of the utilities in connection with the proposed separation, in the city books, of the utility capital accounts. I have been trying to bring about this change in the accounting for over three years. Had this been done on December 31, 1918, the light department (I will deal with the light department only in this report) would have placed to its credit, during the last three years, \$85,997.70. We have used for construction purposes \$13,004.77, thus taking care of all legitimate charges for operation, maintenance and overhead, and also paying for all capital expenditure during said period with a credit balance of \$32,992.93. According to the system in effect we were credited with \$13,466.00 reserves and debited with \$13,004.77 construction costs, the general fund of the city getting the balance, or \$71,831.10, in the last three years. The general fund has been taking from the telephone department sums of money in the same manner, but, of course, not as large. In separating these accounts, according to the treasurer's books the light department has a debit balance of \$26,539.10.

### The Other Statement.

"Your finance committee brought into the joint meeting on Tuesday night a statement showing the light department capital account with a debit balance of \$57,795.09. After deducting our reserves of \$44,083.92 and adding the stores (which by the way is half telephone material) our debit balance would be \$30,842.82.

"As superintendent of your utilities from November, 1912, to date, with the exception of sixteen months viz: May, 1916 to August, 1917, I wish to submit for your consideration, as a public body and also a public body wishing to treat the public utilities of your city in a fair and unprejudiced manner, the following facts connected with the light department operations from December 31, 1912, to date:

"Your auditor's report of December 31, 1912 shows the light department capital expenditure to date as \$91,166.00 and the bonds sold as \$66,000.00. We therefore started the year 1913 with a debit to general fund of \$25,166.00. This report was accepted and passed by the council of that date, I, and the superintendent in charge during my sixteen months absence, together with the several utility committees, have conducted the business of the department and met all charges for operation, maintenance and overhead during all these years. The 1913 council put a \$15,000.00 bylaw for pole line extensions before the people and it passed. We had a \$25,166.00 debt to general fund and \$15,000.00 worth of construction work to be done, yet no council until 1921 saw fit to market the above mentioned bonds. The utility has spent, during these years, over \$70,000.00 in necessary extensions, providing the money out of revenue, and all time,

work has commenced repairing the damaged pier of the Nechako River bridge caused by the heavy ice jam last fall. It is learned that one of the piers will have to be completely renewed and the bridge will necessarily be closed to traffic for a short time.
