First Soccer Match of Season Results in Win Of 4 to 2 For Canucks

The football season opened with a bang last night when the Grotto and the Sons of Canada teams met on the Acropolis Hill grounds before an enthusiastic crowd of soccer fans. The game was fast and clean throughout, terminating in a 4-2 victory in favor of the Sons.

The teams lined up as follows:— Sons of Canada—H. Frizzell, goal; H. Menzies and G. Mitchell, full backs; W. Davis, V. Menzies and E. Tait, half-backs; D. Robinson, W. Anderson, J. Marks, E. Warren and J. Falk, forwards.

Grotto—R. Mercer, goal; G. Whatman and J. Currie, full backs; B. Barrie, Alec. Roy, and J. Hynd, half-backs; P. McGowan, G. Hill, J. Kirby, J. Campbell and S. Butters, forwards.

In the first half the Sons of Canada had the advantage in kicking on the down grade but in spite of this the Grotto boys put up an heroic attempt to find the opposing net. The Sons proved the heavier team but the Grotto were fast. The game opened with quite a deal of mid-field play but after a few minutes going the Sons got busy and pumped quite a number of shots at Mercer who proved himself equal on all occasions and made some brilliant saves. It was a ding-dong tussle and considering the fact that it was the first game of the season both teams showed plenty of "pep." Marks, at centre forward for the Sons, got away with a good opening and made full use of it. Racing down the field, with the ball at his feet, he beat Mercer with a ground ball at short range thus drawing first blood for the Sons. The score at the interval stood 1-0 for the Canadians.

In the second half the Grotto boys made a bold bid for victory. Within four minutes of resumed play, and after a well-contested struggle in front of the Son's goal, J. Kirby was successful in introducing the leather to the Son's net. However, the tie was short-lived and the Canucks hiked up the field, and after a short melee in front of the Grotto goal, W. Anderson again beat Mercer by heading the ball past the "beach." From the centre and after much backward and forward play, Sid Butters put in a good goal for the Grotto again tying the score. However, the Sons were very determined to keep the lead and kept right on the ball, Marks putting in two more goals. The Sons maintained a two goal lead until the end of the game and finished with the lead of 4 to 2.

The defence of the Sons of Canada was very sound. Frizzell was not called upon very often, and the field played good combination. The Grotto, while on the light side, were very fast and proved to their supporters that they were there with the fighting spirit. Their defence in front of

goal will doubtless improve with practice as also will their combination. They are likely to become a team to be reckoned with. At the close of play J. Currie had the misfortune to sprain his ankle.

The game was capably handled by George Russell as referee and Eddie Craggs and Ed. Ross acted as linesmen.

MANSON ASKS FOR AID OF ALL MEMBERS

Effort to Bring About "Safer and Better Liquor Conditions"

VICTORIA, May 9.—To get the working of the liquor laws in British Columbia, the Hon. A. M. Manson, Attorney-General, has asked Conservative, Independent, Liberal and Labor as well as other members into his confidence in connection with the changes that are to be made in the personnel and organization of the Liquor Control Board.

Mr. Manson asks particularly for the opinion of members with regard to the club situation in the province under the present liquor administration.

Malt Liquors

A hint is also contained in a communication which he has sent to all members of the legislature that under his control as Attorney-General he would like to see the liquor question so handled that the consumption of beer and light liquors, if necessary, be increased at the expense of hard liquors.

To Check Bootlegging

I am determined to stamp out bootlegging, as far as that can possibly be done," Mr. Manson said in the statement which was made public at the Parliament buildings last week.

He explains that he is desirous of obtaining an amendment to the Canada Temperance Act to prohibit the importation of liquor into this country for export.

He realizes that we cannot expect the Federal authorities to legislate prohibiting liquor export trade, but if they will prohibit private importation for consumption within the province he will very greatly assist in the administration of the act.

Club Situation

In going thoroughly into the liquor question of liquor administration I am anxious to have the assistance of members of the legislature. I would appreciate it if you would think over the situation as it exists today and give me the benefit of your views. I suggest that you have in mind the activities of the liquor clubs as they have come to your attention.

Home Liquor-Drinking

When I speak of tendencies I would like you to deal with any tendencies towards increased consumption of liquor, particularly hard liquor in the home and the drinking of liquor by

women. "I would also like to have your view as to whether or not our law as it stands increases the consumption of hard liquor.

To Give Moderation

"Our people have asked very emphatically for moderation, and I want to give it to them in the clearest possible manner.

"If our law needs amending so as to bring in the safer and better conditions, I want to see it amended.

"You will agree without my saying so that the matter is one of very great moment to the people of B. C. It is for these reasons I wish to have the benefit of the very best consideration you can give the matter.

Efficiency and economy should be our two watchwords. I know that my fellow members of the legislature will assist me in obtaining these two ends."

WHAT FRED STORK SAID IN COMMONS ABOUT POST OFFICE

Speaking on post office matters in the House of Commons debate recently, Fred Stork, M.P. for Skeena, as reported in Hansard, said

"In reference to the post office situation, if there is anything in the way of precedent in the matter of getting your order in early or of having some justification for your claim, I wish to state that Prince Rupert has been on the map for fifteen years, and it very urgently requires a post office. We have heard a good deal of criticism tonight against the minister for his failure to provide post offices. When the proper time comes, we shall be on deck with our demand for a post office; but I wish to pay a little tribute to the minister. We have had, in Prince Rupert, under the system started some years ago, a very extravagant system of rentals. We have had in that city a federal building housing the post office and the customs department, and various other offices for which the government has paid an annual rental of \$11,400 a year. The minister, I understand, has a proposition before him to remove these offices to other premises, at a rental of \$6,540 a year, and that, I think, is a step in the right direction. The government is practising economy; it is practising economy in the right direction as regards Prince Rupert. We approve that at present; but when the proper time arrives, Prince Rupert will be on deck for a post office of its own."
