### Man and Dog Perish In Remote Trapper's Cabin North Stewart

Lying flat upon his fack in his bunk with the blankets covering his head and his dog nestled under his arm against his side, the body of James Holden, a Stewart trapper, was found on March 23, by Godfrey Anderson, another trapper, in a lonely cabin in the Bowser Lake trapping grounds in the wilderness northeast of Stewart. Both bodies were frozen solid and death had occurred some time between February 10 and March 27. Advice telling of the death was given to Constable J. P. Scarlett last Friday by Anderson on his return from Bowser Lake and all


