**DUCE COUPE  
OIL DRILLING  
BEGINS MARCH**

EDMONTON, Feb. 8.—Drilling the Imperial Oil Company's well recommence on March 1 says visitor from the north country, when a certain depth has been reached it is understood that explosive charges will be used to get through the strata. At the present time the only employees at the well are a carpenter and a tool lesser, but indications of further activity are not wanting, and 150' of casing for the well are being at the Spirit River station to be hauled out to the location.

During the past season the B. government drill, operating at Sherry Lake, 50 miles west of Edmonton, put down four test holes of one inch diameter each, and or five more will be drilled during the coming season.

**Syndicates Interested.**  
Many enquiries are coming in from coast syndicates anxious to acquire acreage; the intention being to group the claims and operate them co-operatively. There is considerable agitation in the northern territory for a railway connecting Brûlé on the C. N. R. with Ponca Coupe, and numerous negotiations have been sent out in regard to the matter. The coasters have also taken up the railway needs of the north and are giving it much publicity. Due to lack of snow up to last week, movement of grain has been very slow, but now that there is no sleighing the elevators are kept busy handling the teams arriving every day. Fur is very plentiful and the appraisers report a successful season.

**RICE DEFALTION IS  
ALMOST AT END SAYS  
IRON MANUFACTURER**

WINNIPEG, Feb. 9.—A prediction that deflation, with the exception of wages and freight rates, has been nearly completed and an expression of hope that coinciding with the spring a steady improvement in business will be experienced, featured an address given before members of the local branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association here by T. R. Deacon, president of the Manitoba Bridge and Iron Works.

In dealing with conditions of his own industry, Mr. Deacon said there had been a decrease in the price of the raw material 60 percent and wages had been replaced approximately 15 per cent. The price of pig iron is still 50 per cent higher than was in 1914, due to long freight hauls. He believed at the point of production both iron and steel are at the lowest point and he considered a reduction in freight rates absolutely necessary before any further reductions could be made. The high freight rates had prevented undertakings of any work of magnitude, as the recent freight rate of 10 per cent, coming after the grain had been practically all loaded, had little effect.

**CLOSE SEASON  
FOR SALMON**

Regulation Just Issued by Inspector of Fisheries for This District.

Regulations for the coming sockeye salmon fishing season have just been issued by J. T. G. Williams, inspector of fisheries as follows:

**Naas River.**

The weekly close period for sockeye fishing on the Naas River last season was 42 hours. This season it is to be extended 6 hours and if the number of gill-net licenses issued exceed 350, an additional 6 hours are to be added.

**Skookum River.**

The weekly close period for sockeye fishing last season was 42 hours and a further 6 hours will be added for the coming season. If the number of gill-net licenses issued exceeds 1100 an additional 6 hours will be added.

**Dean Channel.**

The weekly close period for sockeye fishing last season was 42 hours. An additional 6 hours will be added this season and if the number of gill-net licenses issued exceeds 100, an additional 6 hours will be added.

**Burke Channel.**

The weekly close period for sockeye fishing last season was 42 hours. An additional 6 hours will be added this season and if the number of gill-net licenses issued exceeds 150, an additional 6 hours will be added.

**Fitzhugh Sound.**

The weekly close period for sockeye fishing last season was 42 hours. An additional 6 hours will be added for the coming season and if the number of gill-net licenses issued exceeds 110, an additional 6 hours will be added.

**Rivers Inlet.**

The weekly close period for sockeye fishing during the latter part of last season was 48 hours and if the number of gill-net licenses issued this season exceeds 1000, an additional 6 hours will be added.

**Smiths' Inlet.**

The weekly close period for sockeye fishing last season was 42 hours. An additional 6 hours will be added this season, and if the number of gill-net licenses issued exceeds 215, another 6 hours will be added.

It is the intention that the 6 hours additional weekly close season are to be enforced from the first of the sockeye fishing, no matter how many licenses are issued.

The following will be the weekly close periods during the season of 1922:

Commencing with the opening of the sockeye season: Friday at 6 p.m. to Sunday at 6 p.m.

In the event of an additional 6 hours being necessary, making a total of 54 hours, the close period will be as follows: Friday at 12 noon to Sunday at 6 p.m.

It will be observed that in both cases fishing commences at 6 p.m. on Sunday.

**HOUSING LOANS FOR  
MANITOBA PROVINCE**

WINNIPEG, Feb. 9.—The legislative committee in considering the unemployment question at the parliament buildings this morning decided to recommend that the government should appropriate at least \$1,000,000 for housing loans next summer.

The committee also recommended completion of interior work on the receiving unit of the hospital for mental diseases at Brandon. In bringing in the motion favoring completion, Hon. Thomas Johnson added a rider to the effect A. E. Smith, member for Brandon, should not go back to his constituency and say, "I did it."

The committee rejected a proposal for additional buildings at the prison farm as the structures could be erected by prison labor for \$8,000, while cost of outside labor would be \$66,000, making an extra cost of \$58,000 if the buildings were constructed by unemployed persons.

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Formula for white shirts and collars:  
1st bath, lukewarm water (100% far.) run 5 minutes.

2nd bath, hot water, soap and soda, run 15 minutes.

3rd bath, repeat second bath, run 15 minutes.

4th bath, hot water, add 4 oz. soda, run 10 minutes.

5th bath, hot water, run 5 minutes.

6th bath, water 130% far. Javelle water, run 10 minutes.

7th bath, hot water, 6 oz. sour, run 5 minutes.

8th bath, hot water, blue, run 10 minutes.

9th bath, cold water, rinse, run 5 minutes.

Total time, 80 minutes.

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
