ASK INVESTIGATION BEFORE CLOSING NEW HAZELTON STATION

The Board of Trade at its meeting last night passed a resolution asking the Board of Railway Commissioners to thoroughly investigate the request to close the station at New Hazelton before taking any action in view of the suggested developments in the Silver Standard and other mines in that neighborhood.

The resolution was passed following a request by the New Hazelton people for co-operation to prevent the closing of the station. A letter from C. H. Sawie was read pointing out that the Silver Standard mine had been operating all this year and would continue to operate and ship and that other mines would be operating this year.

It was pointed out however, on behalf of the railway company that the takings of the railway at that point had fallen very low, so low that it was negligible, and the company was losing money through keeping it open.

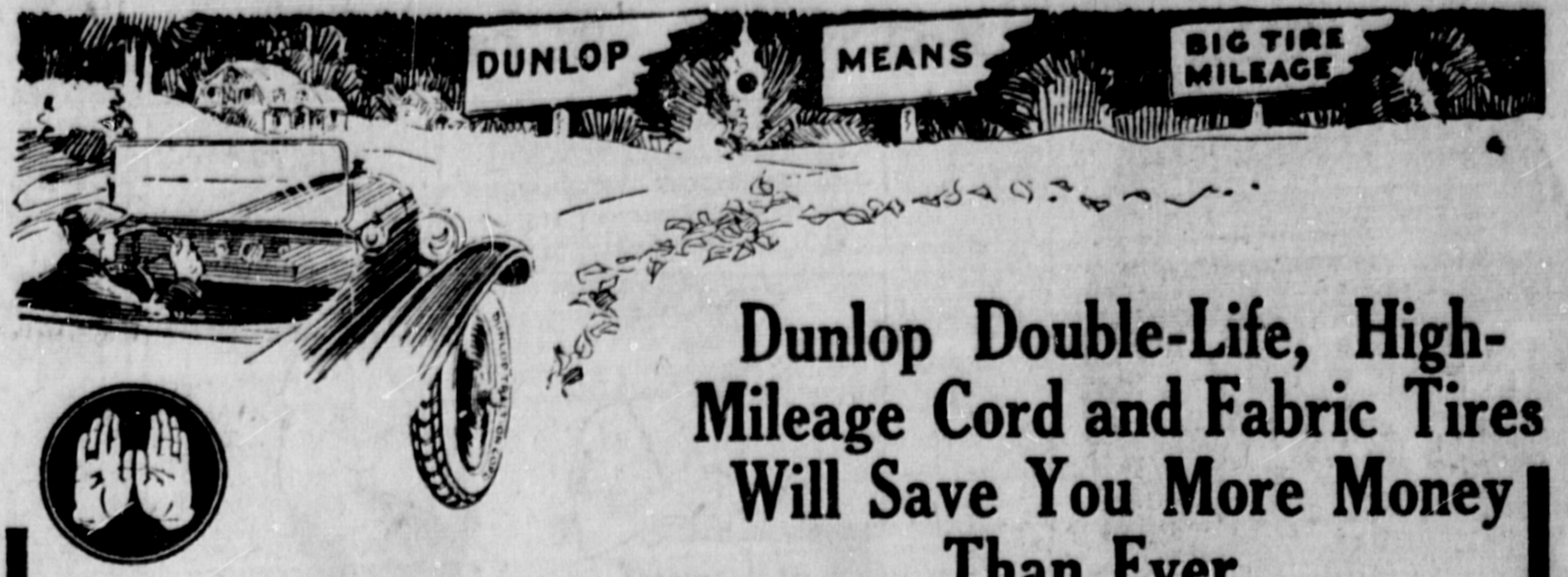
