"That new era of which I have spoken," he went on, "will not be a final one. There is nothing permanent but change, and after the period which I can foresee there will be others of which I know only this that if mankind is allowed to continue on this ball of mud we shall continue our steady evolution toward the heights."

Charlie Bunting may be right or he may be wrong. A verdict cannot be given here. But surely there is something admirable in a man who, while moving with the current of his times, is not afraid to do what he can for an ideal in the face of discouragement and material disadvantage to himself.

Up on the Salmon River Charlie has still his log cabin close to the Premier Mine. He will go north again. He will watch the capitalist deprive the working man of "what he produces." He will watch the gold and the silver leave to play the star part in a "monetary system" which has a false economic basis. And looking out across the living hills perhaps he will again be struck by the anomaly of the position he has been called upon to fill in the world's affairs just as he was struck with it when in the writing room of a Victoria hotel, he laid out the realities and the ideals side by side and compared them, smiling and without bitterness.

PRINCE GEORGE

Several forest fires have been blazing in the district this week and at some places along the line of the railway mills and stations have been in danger. There was a close-in fire across the Fraser River from here on Sunday.

Ivor Bassett, the Revelstoke school principal, who was arrested last week in San Francisco and is being brought back to the province to face a charge of embezzlement, was formerly principal of the Prince George School. Mr. Bassett, though married, eloped with another teacher, Miss Marcia V. Kane.

The Prince George police commissioners are calling for applications for the position of chief of the one man city police force. The salary is \$475 per month.

Charles Kirk and W. Harrison and families, of Portland, Oregon, who have been on a land seeking tour in this district, have returned south. They stated before leaving that the land here was not suitable for their purpose of cattle raising.

John Allen, fifteen year old son of the proprietor of the Prince George Bakery, is in the city hospital suffering from severe burns sustained on Monday when a pot of boiling hot fat fell on him.

DAWSON, June 3.—Major Robert Tucker has been retired on a pension from command of the Yukon division of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He was 39 years in the service and will be succeeded by Captain Edward Telford, who has been in the Yukon 29 years.

G.W.V.A. Found Positions For 65 Returned Men During Month

During the past month some 65 unemployed returned soldiers and members of the G.W.V.A. have been sent to various points for employment. The places to which they have proceeded include Dawson and Yukon territory, Burns Lake, Stewart, Hyder, the salmon canneries, government patrol service. The nationally owned industries have given a number of the returned boys employment recently.

There are still a few unemployed but it is anticipated that these will be absorbed in the near future, as the lumber and other local industries open up.

SMITHERS

The formation of an automobile club in the Bulkley Valley is being mooted. There are now over 50 automobiles in Smithers alone and there is a great demand for more. W. S. Henry, the local Ford agent, is very busy selling cars.

If the present sweltering weather continues there is danger of the Bulkley River overflowing its banks.

A wedding of interest to early settlers in the district took place last week in Smithers when Elizabeth Rolland and Leonard Galvin Ailport, of Rose Lake, were married. Rev. J. S. Brayfield officiating.

There has been considerable real estate activity in Smithers recently. D. A. McRae has purchased from Fred Cook the building which the former has been operating as a boarding house. Mr. Cook has purchased the MacDonald building on Main Street formerly owned and occupied by A. O. Bagstad, now of Prince Rupert.

It has been decided to go ahead with the building of the Boy Scouts' Hall here.

Miss McGregor, matron of the Smithers Hospital, is leaving shortly for Cleveland, Ohio, where she will take a post-graduate course in nursing, hospital administration, anaesthesia and surgery. Miss McGregor was the guest of honor at a tea given by Mrs. C. H. Hankinson last week.

CANADIAN PACIFIC ISSUES SOUVENIR PASSENGER LISTS

An attractive folder containing the names of the tourists who make the round trip to Alaska on the Canadian Pacific steamers is in future to be printed in Prince Rupert by Rose, Gowan & Latta while the vessels are in port on their way north. These are to be provided free of charge to all passengers as souvenirs of the trip. The printing of these is not an innovation but in the past the job has been done in Ketchikan.

The first list of the season was turned out last night by the local printers while the Princess Louise was in port. It contains only names of the passengers going through to Skagway of whom there were over 150 on the steamer last night.
