



BAND SUFFERED GREENVILLE FIRE

Three Cups, Diploma, All Uniforms and Three Instruments Lost.

In the disastrous fire of March 27 which practically cleaned out the little native village of Greenville on the Naas River, the band was a heavy sufferer. Three silver cups and a diploma won at Prince Rupert exhibitions, all the uniforms and three instruments were destroyed. The trophies were especially prized by the Indians and the loss of them caused much grief among the natives. The Greenville Band was the prize winner at the 1921 exhibition. The Northern B. C. Agricultural Association is to be asked to replace the diploma.

The fire, which destroyed 22 houses, originated at one end of the village when an overheated chimney ignited the shingle roof of a house occupied by an old woman. It was impossible for the old woman to get to the roof, and the fire, fanned by a strong wind, soon swept the entire village. The most of the men were at the time at Fishery Bay, some four miles distant, engaging in the oolachan fishing. The alarm was given them by the smoke in the distance but by the time they had arrived at the village the blaze was beyond control. Church and town hall were destroyed but the mission house, some distance away from the rest of the village, was saved. When the natives return from the canneries this fall, it is likely much of the village will be rebuilt.

VICTORIA HAS CUT EXPENSES

Pared First Estimate to Extent of \$120,000—To Tax Improvements.

VICTORIA, April 13.—After weeks of assiduous paring, the City Council has managed to cut its annual estimates to a figure about \$120,000 lower than the original total of \$2,534,570, city officials calculated today after the council tentatively closed its budget. This reduction of \$120,000 represents a cut of some three mills on the total land assessment and brings the total budget down to about \$2,400,000.

City officials had not completed the work of compiling figures to show what tax rate will have to be fixed to raise this sum. As the City Council intends to tax improvements it will not be known for some time exactly what the land and improvements rates will be this year. It is estimated, however, that the Council must this year raise forty per cent more revenue than last year and this can be done, it is calculated, by a levy of twenty-seven mills on the total land assessment and of twenty-seven mills on one-third of the total improvement assessment. This, in fact, is the levy tentatively planned by a majority of the Finance Committee now.

POLITICAL MATTERS WERE DISCUSSED BY T. AND L. COUNCIL

The Trades and Labor Council at the regular fortnightly meeting on Tuesday evening, discussed political affairs in every field, there being some special speeches on the subject.

The council endorsed the stand taken on the Oriental question by Fred Stork, M.P. for Skeena, and T. G. McBride, M.P. for Cariboo. It was decided to communicate with Mr. Stork informing him that extensions and alterations planned on certain cannery plants were to be executed entirely with Oriental labor.

In discussing civic matters, the council went strongly on record with the opinion that the powers and scope given recently to the city engineer were far too wide for a new man. Certain acts of the city engineer with which members of the council differed were brought forward.

Further discussion of the Booth Memorial School matter was left over pending the making of an inspection and report on the building by A. A. Cox, the

FORT NORMAN OIL EBBED AND FLOWED

Report Brought to Edmonton on Condition of Discovery Well.

The discovery well at Fort Norman is by no means "dead" according to advices received by the Bulletin from the north by the Fort McPherson mail, which arrived in Edmonton Friday evening. All through the winter season oil in the well has ebbed and flowed, tokening the fact that the discovery hole is at least something better than a seepage, and the men who have been in residence at Norman are of the opinion that developments may be looked for.

The northern operatives announce that they intend to stake claims on or about April 4, and judging from the tone of the letter received the men on the "inside" are far more optimistic than those elsewhere.

But little drilling has been accomplished on the Imperial Oil Company's claims since the freeze up, due to atmospheric conditions. The Bear Island drill was put down 60 feet, that of the "G" camp located on the west shore of the Mackenzie, 180 feet, while nothing was done at the Bluefish Creek position.
