FORMER ACTRESS SENT TO ASYLUM

"The Sweet Pea Girl" Well Known in Alaska Now at Morningside.

SEATTLE, April 13.—Mrs. Rose Tiffany, known all over the coast as "The Sweet Pea Girl" is at Morningside sanitarium at Portland under treatment as an Alaskan insane.

Her misfortune at this time recalls the part she played in the notorious case of Theodore Durant, the San Francisco murderer, for which part she was written up all over the country as "The Sweet Pea Girl."

Durant was charged with and found guilty of heinously murdering two young girls, Minnie William and Blanch Lamont. The papers of the day were filled with the case and attracted more attention than any other similar case of the time. During the incarceration of Durant, before his trial and afterwards, Mrs. Tiffany, then a young girl, beautiful and an actress of promise, became enamored of the man and daily sent him large bouquets of sweet peas, and during the trial she appeared at every session, each time carrying or wearing a bouquet of sweet peas.

She was written and photographed extensively. For a number of years she has been in Alaskan towns and once before was committed to Morningside.

Mrs. Tiffany was brought from Ketchikan to Morningside in the custody of Deputy Marshal Neil McGregor of Petersburg.
