#### Genoa Conference Restored to Order.

After the flurry of excitement coming like a bolt from the blue by the announcement of the Rapallo Treaty having been signed between Germany and Russia, the Genoa Economic Conference appears to be getting down to business once again. Affecting as it does the two nations whose destinies are possibly offering the greatest problem to the convention, it was not surprising that the "outlaw" pact should have offered a serious menace to the conduct of affairs in hand. France seems to have taken the treaty with more excitement than either England or Italy, and it was no doubt due to the cool management of Premier Lloyd George and Premier Facta that disaster to the conference at its very inception was averted. The Russian question is again before the delegates and, although despatches received early today did not seem to'be very reassuring of a settlement, it is at least gratifying that the conference is now smoothly in progress.

#### Rapallo Treaty May Be of Little Import.

It is true that such a pact as that entered into at Rapallo. between Germany and Russia would have, under ordinary conditions, have presented a very strong combination, but it is also probable that, conditions in these two nations being such as they really are, the treaty may be of little import. Russia is in no condition to carry out the terms of such a treaty without the sanction of the Allies, and Germany is little better off. Although the Allies are allowing the pact to stand in the meantime, they still have the power of controlling any actions under it and, after all, it may have little effect on any ultimate results and decisions that may be made at Genoa respecting Russia and Germany. diplomatic coup, it is true, was attained, but it is not likely it will disturb the general European equilibrium to any great extent.


