FINDING NEW CLASS ROOMS

Special School Committee Given Instructions With Power to Act as Result of Cox Report.

Following the report of A. A. Cox, consulting architect, on the condition of the Booth Memorial School, the school board yesterday instructed its special committee on temporary class housing to proceed at once with the securing of rooms for the temporary accommodation of the eleven divisions which are now without quarters. The committee, which consists of Trustees J. C. McLennan, Thomas McMeekin and Superintendent H. L. Campbell, has been given power to act and is now busy with its task, which is by no means a light one.

School is due to reopen next Monday following the Easter vacation, but it will be impossible to get all classes back at work by that time. First, premises must be secured and the seats, blackboards and other equipment must be moved and set up. The committee has been empowered to engage as many men as necessary in order to have the work done as quickly as possible. No small expenditure will be involved in this work alone.

All the spare space in the King Edward School will be utilized as well as the old domestic science annex on Seventh Avenue East. The Lutheran Church and possibly the Methodist and Baptist church basements will again be used. Vacant stores may also be moved into. If necessary, the domestic science and manual training classes will be dispensed with for the rest of the term.

It will be after the summer holidays, at least, before the classes may again resume at the Booth School.
