U.S. TARIFF IS NOT AFFECTING THE ELECTIONS

Republicans Think They Will Not Be Hurt by Increases

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—(By Canadian Press)—Indications are that the new tariff law will have little effect on the result of the elections next month. Contrary to the general impression when the new law was passed, the effects thus far have not been especially felt in the United States and probably will not be for some little time to come. If this proves to be the case, the democrats will gain little as the result of the new measure and the republicans will not lose, as they feared they would.

Some of the democratic political chiefs are not without a belief that the "big protected interests" are taking care to hold in the reins on prices before the election and not permit them to increase until after the new Congress is chosen. Moreover, there is in the country a large volume of articles imported before the tariff law was enacted.

Shrewd observers of the situation look for the new tariff law to begin to have marked effects in the next few months. They look to see a steady upward tendency in prices in a number of lines of manufactured articles. They predict that a year hence the consumers will look back and see that the tariff has in fact increased the cost of living. Friends of the new tariff law, however, insist the flexible tariff provisions will tend to counteract the increased cost of living and that if the administration sees soaring living costs in any given direction, rates will be reduced.

Taxes Growing

Republican political chiefs—or those who study political tendencies most keenly—are becoming satisfied they will not be hurt to any marked extent by the tariff in the coming election but are wondering if trouble over the tariff is coming in 1924. They are by no means without worry on this score. Moreover, they are reported to be perturbed by complaints from the farmers that their taxes are growing and prices for their products are decreasing and that the new tariff law is not saving them from this decrease. Should the farmers become generally embittered because they feel the new tariff has not helped the prices of their products and at the same time increased prices of manufactured products, it is hard to estimate the political consequences. Such a thing would unquestionably endanger the republicans in 1924.

TRADE WITH ORIENT NATURAL PRODUCTS

Exports and Imports Give Indications of Possibilities

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—(By Canadian Press)—Canada is in an enviable position as far as her trade with the Orient is concerned in the opinion of Max Enos, United States Press representative of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who has returned from an extensive tour of China and Japan during which he made a study of trade conditions.

The Canadians whom he met in the Orient, Mr. Enos declared, are great boosters for the Dominion and are creating an ever growing demand for Canadian products in both China and Japan. Due largely to her superior transportation facilities, Mr. Enos foresees a remarkable growth in the Oriental trade of the Dominion in the near future.

Premier Position

"While Canadian trade is not as large now as it is destined to be," said Mr. Enos, "it certainly is a notable factor in the world's business with the Far East. Although she is recognized to be Great Britain's trading rival in the Orient from the Occident, as distinguished from Great Britain trading through the Suez Canal from Europe, Canada has a personality all her own. This, perhaps is due to the fact that through the Canadian Pacific Canada holds the premier position as a carrier country having the fastest and largest steamships on the Pacific Ocean. Because Canada can use superlatives in discussing transportation gives her "face," that far eastern word the equivalent of which in our country is "front."

"Notwithstanding the fact that there are big competing routes of trade through the United States, it is a flattering commentary on the efficiency of Canada that the Canadian Pacific can retain the superior position in comparison with any of its competitors into the Orient from the West.

Increase 40 Per Cent

"Figures issued recently in a statement by the president of the Canadian Pacific, E. W. Boaty, showed that since 1913-1914 the freight traffic between Canada and the Orient has increased almost forty per cent and that first class travel has increased over four hundred per cent, second class one hundred per cent and steerage considerably over two hundred per cent. These figures are from the records of that company but are a fair index to the increase with all of Canada.

Caadian Goods

"Canada's exports now mainly consist of lumber, fish, grain, flour, asbestos, wood pulp, paper, lead and spelter. There is a growing demand for Canadian manufactured products and, in the opinion of many men who have been in the Orient for years this market could be greatly increased with slight additional effort and a more personal contact with the Far East by the Canadian manufacturers. six months, to the East they would be in a position to profitably take advantage of the abundant opportunities to be found there.

"Japan is in a position to use quantities of raw materials and the products of the mines, fisheries and agriculture. China, however, can not only use great quantities of these products but is a fertile market for manufactured products such as machinery, textiles, hardware and building material. Japan also used a great deal of wheat as flour mills have been established in numbers of late.

Oriental Goods

"Exports to Canada from the Orient consist mainly of rice, spices, tea and silk; Chinese porcelain, curios, toys and other Chinese and Japanese manufactured products of various kinds.

"There is a greater field for trade in China than in Japan. The Japanese are undertaking to build up their own industries and to find a market for their manufactured products outside of their own domains. This they have been able to do to a large extent. With the Chinese it is an entirely different story. They are extremely conservative and unlike the Japanese, are not so imbued with a spirit of nationalism. Once trade is established with a Chinaman it is very hard for a competitor to get him to change. China not only needs all of the machinery and hardware for which there may be a market in Japan, but needs almost all of the manufactured products Canada can supply.

"Agents of other countries are to be found in large numbers in China and these observers bring back to their own countries the results of their observations. The Germans are very active and in many places are prominent now. In Shanghai Hugo Stinnes has a China Company which is doing a big importing, exporting and banking business. The Japanese are strong but in nothing like the degree that is Canada, or Great Britain. The Japanese are not popular in China.

British Prestige

"There is no question as to the prestige of the British. This was very strong before the Prince of Wales made his swing around the world, but is even more so now. He did a great deal to add "face" to the British position, and in the Orient "face" is of inestimable value.

"That there are wonderful opportunities for trade in the Orient and that the part Canada will play in this trade is to be determined by the extent she acquaints herself with conditions and seeks to profit by her observations seems to me to be the gist of opinion of Canadians in the Far East."

SENTENCED BY SOVIET

KHARKOV, Oct. 25.—Twenty insurrectionists accused of operating under General Petlura during the time he was active against the Soviet government, have been sentenced to be shot. They were tried here by an extraordinary revolutionary tribunal of the Ukraine.
