ALBERTA DISCUSSING NEED OF HOME FOR DELINQUENT CHILDREN

Judge and Magistrate Both Urge Care for the Young People Who Go Astray.

EDMONTON, Oct. 5.—The absolute necessity of an institution for those boys and girls who for one reason or another get into court and against whom convictions is seemed, was urged in no uncertain words by Judge Taylor and Magistrate Primrose in addresses before the district meeting of the social service board.

They referred to those children under the care of the neglected children's department. In the opinions of these men, they would rather send them to jail than to the reformatory at Portage la Prairie, and this not so much that there is anything more wrong with the Portage institution than with any other reformatory, but that the whole system was wrong. It was pointed out that a great number of the men and women who come back into the courts as hardened criminals have been in the reformatory so called.

New Institution Needed.
The council passed a resolution asking the government to provide some institution for 'teen age boys and girls who through unfortunate circumstances of one kind or another must be sentenced to some term of punishment.

Professor McPhee, of the University of Alberta, gave a very interesting talk on the reason for most of the crime that is committed, and gave statistics and reasons to show that mental deficiency is mostly the cause. Excessive use of alcohol, said the speaker, on the part of the mother or father, was apt to result in a defective mentality in the child. There was little danger of any harm to the mind of the child during birth, no matter how difficult; neither was there much strength in the old argument that a child's mental condition might be influenced through some pre-natal shock; blows on the head of a normally healthy child had little possibility of making him defective.

The same was true of most of the children's diseases. If the child were strong physically and of good stock, he was not likely to be left defective as the result. Meningitis was one of the most dangerous diseases to the mental life of the child.

Types of Defectives.
The speaker showed the different types of defectives—the idiot, the imbecile and the moron. The idiot was hopeless and nothing could be done for him; he seldom propagated or had sexual impulses. The imbecile was a higher type of intelligence, and sometimes married and propagated. The morons, the next class, developed more slowly and merged over from the imbecile to the dull or backward child. From this class came many of the fallen girls. It was those on the border line between this and normal that made most of the cases in the courts.

Judge Taylor thought it absolutely necessary that Alberta should have an institution for the care of the 'teen age boys and girls that come into the courts. It was not necessary to have an expensive place for them, but a place where they could be cared for and taught. It cost \$1,200 for every conviction in the law courts, and another \$1,600 to care for them after they were convicted, and he considered that much of this could be saved if there were a suitable home for the 'teen age criminals. Most of all, it was necessary to have a suitable man and woman to head the institution, and the judge would send them away for a six months' investigation trip to look into conditions in other similar homes, that the Alberta institution should be the very best it would be possible to make it.

Increase in Crime.

Crime is most certainly on the increase, said Magistrate Primrose. Already to date they had tried 500 more cases in the Edmonton courts than for the same period last year. He went over some of the 'teen age cases that had come before him, and like Judge Taylor, it was only as a very last resort that he sentenced them to Portage. He believed that work was the panacea for most of the badness that came out of these young boys and girls, and prevention was much better than cure. The youth of the day had gone crazy over pleasure and they needed money to buy their pleasures, which were displayed to them in the most alluring forms. He criticized the city for having built the swimming pool and then charged an admittance fee. He thought the money well spent, if it had cost eight thousand dollars more than was expected. The children of today also inherited the tendency of the land boom and the loose manner in which their parents think of large sums of money. Magistrate Primrose advocated the employment of a level-headed preventative officer on the police force of the city, who would watch the young fellows and girls and help to keep them right, instead of punishing them for wrong after it is committed.

FARMERS TO DISCUSS SYSTEM OF BANKING

Suggestion That Dominion Should Issue All Paper Currency.

EDMONTON, Oct. 5.—Elimination of Canadian bank notes and the issuance of all paper money by the Dominion government, establishment of a Canadian National bank, along the lines of the Commonwealth Bank of Australia, to compete with existing banks, and government inspection of banks will be discussed by the district locals of the United Farmers of Manitoba this winter, with the possibility that resolutions along these lines will be drafted for presentation to the annual convention to be held in January.

Farmer organizations in Saskatchewan and Alberta probably will discuss these suggestions, also, in view of the fact that the charters of all banks in Canada expire in July 1923. Prior to this, the Dominion government will consider the re-enactment of the Canada Bank Act, while the banking committee of the house will consider suggestions made by different organizations for amendments to the act.

HOME CONSTRUCTION WINNIPEG THIS YEAR

Building Fifty Per Cent More Than Last Year.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 5.—Winnipeg's home construction to date is 50 per cent greater than the whole of 1921 home building program, according to figures issued today by the city building inspector. So far this year, permits have been issued for 667 houses, of which 225 are being built under the civic housing loan. The total number of homes built last year were 440, giving an increase of 227 houses so far this year.

The week's building permits show unusual activity for this time of the season, \$18,000 having been issued. The year's building aggregates \$6,322,850. Permits issued during the week include 14 houses and seven stores and other commercial buildings. Among these is a \$25,000 permit for a laundry to be built for M. Penfold on Burnell, near St. Matthew's, and a \$16,000 permit for stores to be built for Col. William Grassie on the southwest corner of River and Osborne.

In addition to these, E. H. Rodgers today issued a \$56,000 permit for repairs to the Kennedy building, which was recently gutted by fire.
