

Iron Industry Is Being Investigated at Ottawa.

Realizing that Canada has been paying annually millions of dollars for steel products purchased in the United States and that steel plants in the interior of Ganada have been dependent upon the United States for their supplies of iron ores, the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research at Ottawa has been investigating the native iron ore resources and has received reports from its committees that it is time to undertake the special treatment required by Canadian ores to fit them for commercial reduction to pig iron. It is hoped thereby to establish a new and important home industry.

Of Particular Interest Here.

The work of the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research in its efforts towards exploiting the iron and steel industry is of expecial interest to the Pacific Coast and to this district of Prince Rupert especially. The council doubtless knows, as a result of its investigations, that here on this coast are located all the requisites to the iron and steel industry strategically situated close to Prince Rupert as the site of the proposed smelter and Remove --refinery, that would be needed in making steel. Nor does the difficulty exist here that does in some parts of Canada—the necessity of importing raw materials from long distances or even from the United States. The council might be a good body to take this matter up with.
