50,000 UNEMPLOYED IN CITY OF VIENNA

And Situation is Becoming Worse Every Day—Cannot Compete With Germany.

VIENNA, April 27.—The result of the "Spring Fair" has been disappointing. The fact is that this country can no longer compete successfully with Germany, owing to the high wages, taxes, and other levies, and the continually rising prices of all commodities.

Unfortunately, none of the people responsible seem to be ready to make sacrifices. The agrarian profiteers go on fleecing the population. In many industries the workmen are threatening to demand higher wages, and much bitter feeling prevails on both sides. In fairness, however, to the men it must be admitted that some big employers have made up their minds to break the power of the Social Democrats' organizations.

Many Unemployed.

The latest official statement mentions 50,000 unemployed, and the number is growing daily. Unemployment is worst in the industries of "luxury articles." The hotels have suffered badly, as since the riots of December the number of visitors from abroad has diminished considerably. In some quarters the fear of riots looms large, and in a Vienna factory district a municipal councillor has gone so far as to try to form a sort of "Orgesch" for "self-defence," which is to include ex-soldiers, women, and even lads under eighteen.
