Greed Unrestrained  
And Unshamed.

The Vancouver World of Monday under a head "Fish and Greed," has the following editorial article:

Imposing a duty of two cents a pound on fish caught by Canadian fishermen is looked upon as a measure of good government by American fishermen having boats plying in Northern British Columbia waters. But when the same duty is imposed on fish caught by American fishermen and shipped to market through a Canadian port, the American fishermen are galled by the tyranny of government. Their gentle demand is to have Canadian fishermen put out of business by a prohibitive tariff, so that they, the American fishermen, will be the only purchasers of herring bait in Northern British Columbia harbors, and the only shippers of fish to market over the Canadian National Railway from the Prince Rupert Terminal.

Nothing stands between Canadian fishermen and business extermination except the Canadian law that no bait shall be sold in Canadian harbors except to vessels which ship their catches through Canadian ports. This law really puts Canadian and American fishermen on an equality of competitive business in the fishing industry because Prince Rupert is the only northern port having rail connection, and there is no other means of sending northern fish to market except via Prince Rupert. Also there is no place to buy bait except at British Columbia harbors.

The American fishermen want to use British Columbia bait, and ship to market over the Canadian National railway, and to shut Canadian fishermen out of the same market by a prohibitive tariff duty. This would seem to be the most graphic illustration of greed unrestrained and greed unshamed by which even the greed-stained policies of vote-buying, tariff-promising politicians have been defaced.

Juneau Opinion Of  
Proposed New Law.

The Juneau Empire discussed the fish situation as follows:

The Pointexter Alaska fish amendment to the tariff bill is not designed to force the shipment of Alaska halibut through Seattle at all, and, if it becomes the law, it probably will not do so. Alaska fish may continue to go east over the Grand Trunk railway, but it must be put in cold storage and bonded at an American port if it is to avoid the two cents a pound duty. It would bring the buyers from Prince Rupert to American towns, affording similar competition among buyers as now prevails. In fact it would improve the situation because all buyers would be brought into direct competition in the bidding, whereas now, when the fish is taken to Prince Rupert, buyers in Alaska towns are really barred by the fact that fishermen, having their boats there, are practically forced to sell to some of the buyers at that place. The Pointexter amendment would bring the buyers for Seattle and other points at the south and those who purchase to ship East over Canadian lines up against each other.

Must Pay More  
Or Fishermen Get Less.

As we see the situation today it means that if the duty stands the American people will either pay more for their fish or the fishermen will get less. It will undoubtedly cost a lot more to handle the fish through an Alaskan port than through Prince Rupert and both fishermen and public will suffer. Any attempt to force business out of its natural channel is usually abortive and injures more people than it benefits.

The other point which affects the fishermen, the dealers and the ultimate consumers is that fish packed at an Alaskan port and shipped as is proposed will take a day or two longer to reach the consumer and will therefore not be in as good condition as if shipped from this port. The additional handling also affects the quality of the fish.

It is curious that a mere handful of people interested in real estate should be able to influence the United States Senate to induce them to handicap the fishermen who really do the work and also to interfere with the food supply of the people. In politics, however, a great many curious things happen and more so in American politics than in Canadian.

One person who seems likely to benefit from the move is the Canadian fisherman. He will still have the opportunity of shipping his fish to the States in the best possible condition and, even though he has to pay a duty of two cents, he will have the advantage over his fellows who fly the American flag. Quality will count.

FISH DINNER  
FOR WINNIPEG

Elks to Make Arrangements to  
Have Spread Put on During  
Grand Lodge.

Arrangements are well under way for a fish dinner to be put on by the local lodge of Elks aided by the fish merchants and others in the city. Last night the publicity committee and Fisheries committee of the Board of Trade decided to make a grant of \$25 to aid the enterprise and also they will have a thousand advertising leaflets of information regarding the city sent for distribution at the same time.

The city council has already voted \$25, Lipsett, Cunningham Co. have given a like amount and others are to be asked to contribute so that a creditable affair may be put on and proper display be made along with it.

Ralph Lepine met the Board of Trade committees last night and explained what was intended to be done. The fish dealers had donated all the fish necessary for the purpose, half of it being given by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. The arrangements were now so far advanced that they were bound to go ahead. Two local delegates would be sent to represent the city and they would look after the details. The dinner was to be given on the opening evening of the big convention.

The members of the committee were all favorable to making the grant and felt that this was an advertising opportunity that should not be passed up.

The occasion of the dinner is the annual convention of the order of Elks.
