Juneau Opinion Of Proposed New Law.

The Juneau Empire discussed the fish situation as follows: The Poindexter Alaska fish amendment to the tariff bill is not designed to force the shipment of Alaska halibut through Seattle at all, and, if it becomes the law, it probably will not do so. Alaska fish may continue to go east over the Grand Trunk railway, but it must be put in cold storage and bonded at an American port if it is to avoid the two cents a pound duty.
