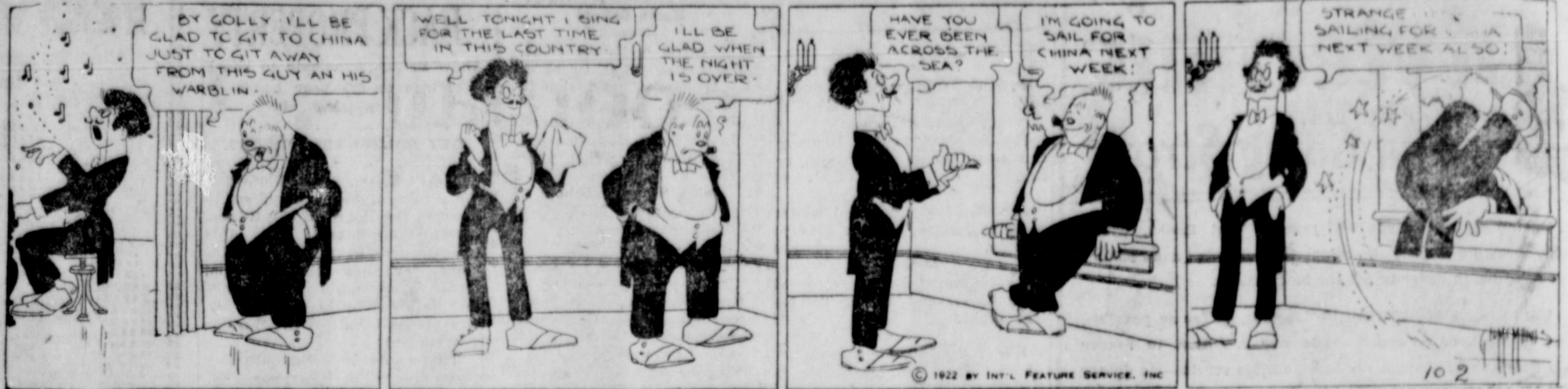
AEROPLANE HAZELTON FLIGHTS YESTERDAY
